15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The Madras Christian College, committed to providing multidisciplinary options, implemented a comprehensive education model in 2004. This model, featuring a choice-based credit system, allows students to explore subjects from other disciplines. As part of the curriculum, students are required to take General Electives, General Courses, and Interdisciplinary Courses. These courses, a part of Part IV of the curriculum, are in addition to the mandatory Major subjects in Part III. The interdisciplinary courses, spread over five semesters for the undergraduate programme, require students to take classes from different departments and disciplines, ensuring a broad-based education and diverse learning experience. For instance, economics majors can study philosophy, statistics, and languages, gaining a broad understanding of the world. History majors can explore commerce and zoology courses, broadening their knowledge base. Cross disciplinary courses like 'Everyday Physics' for philosophy majors promote critical thinking and its application in real-life situations. BSc Chemistry students can study history or literature, enhancing their understanding of the world. Zoology majors can delve into subjects like political science or economics, gaining a comprehensive understanding of the world. These specialized programs prepare students for real-life situations, ensuring they are well-equipped for success in an interconnected world.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Madras Christian College (Autonomous) strongly believes in imparting of substantial knowledge and building one's character by cutting across disciplines. This thrust of the college is aligned with the National Education Policy 2020. This has laid a foundation for flexibility within the existing academia to foster multidisciplinary and holistic education across Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences, Sciences, Commerce and Sports. The college has taken the following steps concerning registering in the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC). In response to the directive from the University Grants Commission, the college has taken proactive steps to implement the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC). The Controller of Examinations is the Nodal Officer for the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC). The NAD ID of Madras Christian College is NAD097497. The ABC registration was approved on 10th December 2024. The College has informed the students to register in <https://www.digilocker.gov.in/>

17.Skill development:

17. Skill development Skill development is pivotal in achieving the objectives set by the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, which aims for a Gross Enrolment Ratio of 50% in higher education, including vocational education, by 2035. A gradual approach is being adopted to realise this vision, introducing vocational courses in various disciplines yearly. After getting Autonomy Status by UGC in 1978, College had started School of Continuing Education to offer Certificate, Diploma and PG Diploma value-added and employability-Skill enhancement courses. The School has Skill Development Centre became functional from May 2024 onwards, when the Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship Government of India through the Indian Centre for Research and Development of Community Education designated it as a National Skill Development Corporation Training Centre (ID: TC221177). The Madras Christian College Skill Development Centre has been given approval to start the following courses: 1.Sewing Machine Operator 2.Fashion Designing 3.Accounts Executive 4.Web Developer 5.Media Developer 6.Junior Software Developer 7.Domestic Data Entry Operator 8.Multi-Cuisine Cook Also, MCC prioritised the formation of an integrated personhood through relevant practices, programs, and events built into the academic calendar. The establishment of Dr Devanesen Centre for Human Resource Development in 2004 is another attempt to pursue the college's vision. As a part of Curriculum, the Centre offers Personality Development Course for the Undergraduate students and Personality Enrichment for the Postgraduate students. College has signed nearly 50 MoUs with Industries to establish Industry-Academia tie-up for Internship, Field work and Skill Development Courses. Moreover, vocational programmes in History on Archaeology and Museology provide comprehensive study options that combine theoretical knowledge with practical skills, ensuring students are well-prepared for the employability as well as higher studies. B.Sc. Hospitality and Tourism programme is a complete industry-oriented employability programme which equips the students for job placement. Additionally, the institution offers various specialised courses catering to the demands of emerging fields. These courses cover a wide range of subjects, such as Web designing, Mobile App Development, Business Communication, E-commerce, Sports Management, Recreation, and Camping, as well as Writing for Media, Radio Station Management, Video Jockeying, Short Film Production, and E-content Creation. By embracing innovation and focusing on skill development, students are equipped to keep pace with global advancements in various industries. The institution's commitment to community

development is exemplified by its community colleges, which actively respond to the local community's needs. These colleges organise periodic skill development workshop and training programmes to empower women and marginalised sections of society. The institution fosters inclusivity and socioeconomic progress by equipping these individuals with relevant skills. In conclusion, the institution is taking incremental steps to introduce vocational courses across disciplines. The institution nurtures well-rounded individuals who can thrive in a rapidly evolving global landscape with a diverse range of specialised classes and initiatives focused on community empowerment. By equipping students with practical skills and knowledge, the institution contributes to developing a skilled workforce that can drive innovation and growth in various sectors.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

At Madras Christian College, we are committed to passing rich legacy and heritage of India's cultural and intellectual traditions to the present generation of students. Aligned with the University Grants Commission (UGC) guidelines on the integration of Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS) into higher education curricula, we have included courses that are based on culture and traditions of India. Departments were sensitised to incorporate IKS based courses into their curricular framework during the syllabus revision in 2023 - 24. MCC offers a wide range of courses that integrate IKS across various disciplines: Social Work: In the Social Work programme, students explore Indigenous People and Tribal Development, fostering an understanding of the unique challenges and development needs of these communities. Tamil: Courses such as Tamil Ilakiya Varalaru and Sanga Ilakiyam delve into Tamil literary history and classical literature. Philosophy: Subjects include Foundations of Indian Philosophy, Outlines of Contemporary Indian Philosophy, Buddhism, Cyber Siddhanta, and Religious Art and Architecture of South India. History: Offers comprehensive papers on the History of India, History of Madras, Contemporary Tamil Nadu, History of South India, Ecological History of India and Socio-Cultural and Economic History of India. Economics: Introduces Agricultural Economics to highlight traditional economic practices. English (Self-Financed Stream): Features courses on Regional Literature and Translation and Classical Indian Literature and Culture. Physical Education: Promotes wellness through Yoga and Exercise for Healthy Living. Geography: Offers Socioeconomic and Cultural Geography. Botany: Ethnobotany allows students to explore the plants associated with cultural and socio-religious activities, emphasizing the significance of traditional knowledge in various domains.

Hospitality and Tourism studies: This programme has courses like "Heritage of India" and "Indian Art and Architecture," which instil a deep appreciation for the country's cultural wealth. Additionally, courses like "Tourism Products of India" focus on promoting folk dances, handicrafts, Indian painting, fairs, festivals, and cuisines, showcasing diverse cultural tapestry of India. Part One language courses emphasize Indian languages, while cultural events celebrate traditions and foster a sense of unity. The student body's diversity, comprising individuals from various states and countries, provides a rich cultural fabric. This environment nurtures respect, tolerance, and social values, shaping students into responsible citizens of India. MCC encourages the faculty to attend the UGC-Malaviya Mission Teacher Training Centre - Online NEP Orientation and Sensitisation Programme and workshops, conferences, and online courses aimed at enhancing their understanding of IKS and its pedagogical applications. Faculty training programs equip educators with the tools to incorporate IKS into their teaching practices meaningfully. Through its innovative approaches and commitment to integrating Indian Knowledge Systems, MCC continues to lead the way in higher education. By nurturing rich legacy of Indian traditions and fostering interdisciplinary learning, the institution prepares students to face the modern world with an approach firmly grounded in Indian culture and knowledge systems. It instils a sense of pride in the country's heritage while fostering a mindset that can appreciate and contribute to global diversity. MCC's initiatives equips students to become culturally sensitive and adaptable individuals, ready to tackle the challenges of an interconnected world.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome-Based Education at Madras Christian College Madras Christian College (MCC) has embarked on a significant transformation of its curriculum towards Outcome-Based Education (OBE), aligning its teaching and learning practices with the vision of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. **Institutional Initiatives for OBE Transformation** Faculty Development: Recognizing the crucial role of faculty in implementing OBE, MCC conducted comprehensive capacity-building programs in both online (2020) and offline (2021) modes. These programs focused on the principles of OBE, its implementation strategies, and the development of Learning Outcomes and Course Objectives (LOCO). Curriculum Development: In 2022, the college circulated the LOCF template to all departments, guiding them in aligning their curricula with specific learning outcomes. From June 2023, the college implemented the LOCF-based curriculum across all programs, marking a significant step towards achieving an outcome-

oriented approach to education. Bloom's Taxonomy: To further enhance teaching and learning, MCC conducted faculty development programmes on Bloom's Taxonomy in 2023. This framework provides a structured approach to designing learning activities and assessments that cater to different levels of cognitive skills, from basic knowledge to higher-order thinking skills such as analysis, evaluation, and creation. Capturing OBE in Teaching and Learning Practices: LOCF-Based Assessment: The college has developed a common LOCF question paper model for both UG and PG programs in Arts and Science, ensuring consistency and clarity in assessing student learning outcomes. Separate question paper models have been devised for internal exams and end-semester exams, allowing for a comprehensive evaluation of student progress. Data-Driven Approach: To measure the attainment of learning outcomes, the college has implemented a system where faculty members enter question-wise marks into a dedicated portal. This data can be analyzed to identify areas of strength and weakness in student learning, allowing for continuous improvement in teaching and learning practices. Good Practices in View of NEP 2020: Focus on Holistic Development: The emphasis on Bloom's Taxonomy in teaching and assessment aligns with NEP 2020's focus on fostering higher-order thinking skills and cultivating creativity and innovation among students. Data-Driven Decision Making: The use of data to analyze student performance and inform instructional decisions reflects NEP 2020's emphasis on evidence-based practices and continuous improvement in education. Student-Centric Approach: The focus on student learning outcomes and the provision of a supportive learning environment through faculty development programs reflects a student-centric approach to education, as advocated by NEP 2020. By implementing these initiatives and continuously refining its practices, Madras Christian College is striving to create a dynamic and engaging learning environment that equips students with the knowledge, skills, and values necessary to thrive in the 21st century. 20. Distance education/online education:

Distance, Online, and Blended Learning Initiatives at Madras Christian College Madras Christian College (MCC) is actively exploring the potential of distance and online learning to enhance educational offerings. The institution recognizes the growing demand for flexible and accessible education and is taking steps to leverage technology to meet these evolving needs. MCC facilitates Microsoft Certification exams on campus through the School of

Continuing Education, enabling students to achieve globally recognized qualifications. This focus on flexible, self-paced learning caters to individual needs and prepares students for competitive professional environments. Students are encouraged to take up online courses through the NPTEL SWAYAM, Coursera, edx platforms. MCC has made significant investments in e-content development. The Meston centre for Teaching and Learning (MCTL) is a state-of-the-art recording lab for developing and editing educational videos. The centre plays a crucial role in developing and delivering high-quality online learning resources. It serves as a hub for faculty development, providing training on instructional design, technology integration, and online teaching methodologies. The college's commitment to integrating technology into education is evident in its use of video lectures, online assessments, and use of platforms like Google Classroom for communication and information sharing. The usage of webtools promote active learning, foster peer interaction, and enhance faculty-student engagement. Blended learning combines online resources with in-person instruction, offering a comprehensive educational experience. MCC employs a blended learning approach, combining online resources with in-person instruction. This approach enhances student engagement and caters to diverse learning styles. The College practices hybrid mode / online teaching for compensatory classes. The student centre at the Library offers opportunities for the students to access educational material through institutional memberships and subscriptions. Good practices in the Institution: One internal assessment is dedicated to testing students through innovative methods such as seminar, assignment, term paper, video content, project or any other component allowing the students freedom to express their understanding of the subject in creative ways. Innovation Contest is conducted annually by the Institution Innovation Council (IIC) where students exhibit their ideas in their subject and judged by experts from the faculty and industry. MCC's initiatives in blended learning create a dynamic and flexible educational framework. By combining technology, strategic industry partnerships, and innovative teaching methods, the college empowers students to excel in a competitive global environment. Digital learning empowers students with technological proficiency, enabling them to seamlessly integrate technology into their academics. This enhances their adaptability and prepares them for a rapidly evolving world, fostering personal and professional growth.

Departments offer specific courses addressing key issues such as Green and Environmental Chemistry, Women's Studies, Human Rights, Rural and Urban Community Development, Feminist Philosophy, Environmental Justice, Business Ethics, Data Privacy and Security, Eco-tourism, Media Ethics, Health and Safety Education, and more.

Service learning, outreach, and extension activities allow students to actively participate in collaborative efforts to find solutions to cross-cutting challenges.

Workshops, guest lectures, and seminars focusing on these themes further educate and foster dialogue among students, encouraging them to develop a deeper understanding of these issues. Through these efforts, MCC prepares students to engage meaningfully with complex societal challenges, fostering critical thinking, social responsibility, and collaborative problem-solving.

Advanced learners are supported with opportunities like advanced coursework, independent research, and projects. They receive guidance for competitive exams such as CSIR-NET, UPSC, and TNPSC and are encouraged to participate in government-funded initiatives, training sessions, and workshops. PG students benefit from mandatory summer internships that develop their research skills. Additionally, they are motivated to complete projects and publish papers in UGC and SCOPUS-indexed journals, fostering deeper engagement and interest for learning.

Slow learners are supported through tailored reading materials, simpler textbooks, and personalized teaching methods. Teachers provide additional instructional support and interact with these students outside the classroom to address challenges. Parent-Teacher Meetings are held to review both academic and non-academic progress, enabling collaboration between parents and faculty to address learning barriers. The Department of English offers need-based streams with customized curricula for Part II English in the second, third, and fourth semesters, ensuring equitable learning opportunities based on students' abilities.

Madras Christian College emphasizes experiential and participative learning to enhance students' practical and theoretical understanding. Experiential learning engages students in hands-on activities, experiments, field trips, and projects, equipping them with skills in both classical and applied branches. Innovative initiatives like the Social Experience Laboratory, Mind Labs, Rural Camps, Study Tours, and Observation Visits immerse students in real-world scenarios, bridging theory with practice.

Participative learning fosters active student involvement through discussions, debates, quizzes, group projects, and poster workshops. Students also organize and participate in conferences and workshops, encouraging collaboration and knowledge-sharing. Many departments adopt flipped classrooms to create a dynamic learning environment.

Problem-based and project-based learning methods further develop students' critical thinking and problem-solving skills. By addressing real-world issues, students research potential solutions, collaborate with peers, and create innovative approaches. Activities like case studies, community issue resolution, and situation analysis help students tackle complex challenges effectively. Additionally, programs such as dialectics and technology-based methods prepare students for evolving domain-specific challenges.

Through these approaches, students cultivate analytical thinking, creativity, and empathy-driven solutions, empowering them to navigate real-world problems with confidence and adapt to changing professional landscapes. These methodologies build a foundation for lifelong learning and impactful contributions.

Madras Christian College integrates traditional chalk-and-board teaching with modern IT-enabled methods to create an engaging and industry-relevant learning environment. Departments are equipped with Wi-Fi, projectors, laptops, printers, and software like SPSS, Adobe, and Microsoft systems. The college leverages ICT-enabled tools and online resources to transform traditional teaching, making it interactive and accessible.

The library is fully digitalized, offering access to N-LIST and NDLI portals through OPAC. Google Classroom facilitates sharing syllabi, reading materials, and online resources. Wi-Fi-enabled classrooms support virtual interactions with experts, while faculty use tools like Ed Puzzle and podcasts to enhance the learning experience.

Students use online compilers for programming in C and C++ and tools like Canva, Easel.ly, and Visme for creating diagrams and documentation for projects. Canva is also employed in designing web pages and forms for User Interface and User Experience projects. Virtual Reality (VR) and Augmented Reality (AR) software provide immersive learning experiences. Students are encouraged to build online portfolios to showcase their skills to potential employers.

By blending traditional methods with advanced technology, the college ensures students gain practical, industry-aligned skills while fostering innovative, interactive, and immersive learning experiences.

A Committee meticulously drafts College Calendar after receiving inputs from Departments and Units of the College. It contains information on CBCS, ICA, ESE, Cultural Events and public holidays. It provides a framework for organising curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities, aligning teaching objectives with learning outcomes, and facilitating a conducive learning environment. The Departments decide on their calendar and teaching plan. Three parameters are used in planning for the Academic Calendar. First, events are scheduled based on three guiding principles of College, namely Academic Excellence, Social Relevance and Spiritual Vitality. Second, the planning and organisation of the programmes, such as exams, assessments, and holidays, are well-coordinated and communicated in advance. Third, allocation of resources such as faculty involvement, classroom material availability and budget. The departments also organise events specific to their domain. This is in addition to the teaching plans, with strict adherence to the timetable given to each professor. Besides traditional teaching methods, group discussions and seminars are integral to teaching-learning. Group discussions help students to express their opinions. Teachers play a crucial role in encouraging discussions in class to listen to

the students' views and to encourage them to interact, thereby making students feel valued and their contributions necessary.

Madras Christian College has significantly enhanced its Examination Management System (EMS) through the integration of IT and reforms in examination procedures, including Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA). With the adoption of the Learning Outcome Curriculum Framework (LOCF) from the academic year 2023-24, the college introduced a new question paper model for both Internal Continuous Assessment (ICA) and End-of-Semester Examinations, where questions are mapped to course objectives and

knowledge levels. Guidelines for rubric preparation were also provided to maintain consistency in assessments.

To streamline examination procedures, the college introduced online registration for exams, including application form submissions and fee payments. E-Hall Tickets are now available in PDF format on the college website. The Course Registration Slip (CRS) was also implemented to verify the courses students have opted for in each semester.

Online entry and publication of ICA marks through the student mobile app and website have also been introduced. Additionally, online student feedback is linked to the release of E-Hall Tickets. Anti-plagiarism software like Urkund and Turnitin is used to ensure academic integrity, enhancing both transparency and efficiency in the examination process.

The Research & Development Cell (RDC) plays a pivotal role in enhancing the research environment, supporting publications, and safeguarding intellectual property through patent assistance. Faculty members and research scholars who publish in high-impact journals such as Scopus, Web of Science, or UGC-CARE indexed journals are

recognized with certificates of appreciation and financial incentives.

For the 2023-24 academic year, the College has allocated Rs. 6 lakhs as seed funding to support the research projects of six faculty members, enabling exploration of new academic frontiers. The RDC also provides essential resources and guidance to faculty for submitting competitive research proposals.

The MCC Research Colloquium, established in 2020, offers a collaborative platform for discussions on research opportunities, methodology, ethics, and dissemination. Additionally, the MCC-MRF Innovation Park reflects the College's commitment to advancing research and innovation. Through these initiatives, MCC strives to cultivate an environment conducive to intellectual growth, benefiting faculty, researchers, students, and the broader community.

3.3.1 - Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and creation and transfer of knowledge supported by dedicated centres for research, entrepreneurship, community orientation, incubation, etc.

The institution promotes a strong culture of Innovation and Entrepreneurship through the collaborative efforts of various units, namely the MCC-Institution Innovation Council (MCC-IIC),

the MCC-Entrepreneurship Development Cell (MCC-EDC), and the MCC-MRF Innovation Park (MMIP). MCC-IIC is dedicated to promoting innovation by conducting awareness sessions, training programs, and innovation contests, which helps to identify promising student ideas. These ideas are nurtured further at MMIP, a state-of-the-art ecosystem supporting advanced research, startups, and entrepreneurship.

In addition to offering comprehensive support for students through bootcamps, mentoring, and funding facilitation, MMIP has played a pivotal role in nurturing over 150 startups, raising ₹2 crore in funding, and facilitating the filing of 18 patents (16 faculty-led and 2 from startups). Notable initiatives include "Tie and Twine," a student-developed product co-created with Funskool, which is now available for sale on e-commerce platforms and in retail stores.

Moreover, MMIP extends its support beyond traditional sectors by engaging with tribal and fishing communities in collaboration with MCC's Family Life Institute and Pulicat Community College. Through its robust innovation ecosystem, MMIP also facilitates research commercialization and patenting processes, with guidance from the IPR Cell, creating a comprehensive platform for both students and faculty to thrive in research and entrepreneurship.

The college has implemented an extensive network infrastructure, including underground fibre optical cables spanning the campus, along with sixty-seven high-speed Wi-Fi hotspots strategically placed throughout. This ensures Wi-Fi accessibility in key areas such as classrooms, laboratories, the library, staff rooms, and seminar halls wherein staff and students can access data and high speed internet (100 Mbps) via W-Fi hotspots connected with UPS ensuring seamless connectivity.

Sophos XG 330 Network Protection ensures multi-layered Advanced Threat Protection. Activities over routers, switches and devices are continuously monitored. Deploying command-and-control detection, an Intrusion Prevention System (IPS), and a VPN gateway, safeguards the network by thwarting potentially harmful incoming and outgoing traffic. Availability of Multiple Internet Service Provider, Secure IDs facilitates secure access of system for authorised users.

The institution is allocating budget for hardware and software procurement under capital expenditure. For routine maintenance, budget is allocated under computer expenditures overhead.

The External Auditors are appointed by the Board of Directors of the College. The scope of the audit is designed by the auditors to meet the various statutory and College requirements.

The Scope of the audit normally includes:

- Scholarship & Prizes
- Foreign Receipts and Payments
- Stock Verification

The auditors check the supporting documents such as invoices, bills, and purchase orders, in addition to whether the requisite procedures such as three Quotations, Purchase Committee Minutes, etc., are followed for payments (bills of high value). The auditors ensure that statutory payments like GST, TDS, ESI, and EPF are made on time and that statutory returns are filed on time.

Any query/observation in the course of the audit is clarified with the concerned person in charge.

Apart from the above audits, Government aid accounts are audited by the Joint Directorate of Collegiate Education and Office of the Accountant General, Tamil Nadu.

Madras Christian College (MCC) focuses on maintaining high academic standards through a continuous evaluation process of its teaching methodologies, operational structures, and learning outcomes. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) leads periodic reviews to ensure that academic programs remain relevant and aligned with accreditation standards, aiming for continuous improvement and holistic student development.

In the academic year 2023-24, MCC's IQAC conducted an internal academic audit for the 2022-23 Annual Report of departments. The evaluation of 14 Aided and 14 Self-Financed departments for the Best Performing Department Award involved three stages: IQAC team review, Core Committee evaluation, and final assessment by the principal and an external expert committee. The audit considered research publications, departmental activities, and internship programs, with final scores based on both qualitative and quantitative metrics.

Additionally, MCC gathers feedback from students to assess curriculum effectiveness. In April 2024, feedback from UG and PG students highlighted high satisfaction with course content,

relevance to skill development, employability, and resource adequacy. This data will guide future syllabus revisions. The IQAC also organizes faculty training to enhance teaching and evaluation processes, ensuring that MCC's curriculum remains comprehensive and up-to-date in its mission to transform lives through education.

The institution has prioritized the management of both degradable and non-degradable waste with the aim of creating a Zero-Waste

Campus. The institution has a sewage treatment system with a Rs.1.30 crore investment. The closed drainage system filters sewage water for agricultural use, yielding 3.75 lakh litres of grey water and valuable manure daily. MCC Farm has a modernized Sewage Treatment Plant with 3 lacs lit. capacity. Natural water purifiers, copper balls, and an ejector system contribute to environmental sustainability, while recycled water from RO plants is utilized for washrooms and gardening. The Estate office manages the disposal of both degradable and non-degradable waste on the campus. The SWAWSA and WAMSA units are playing a vital role in the waste minimization project to reduce littering and facilitate easy segregation of waste. The Department of Zoology has been following unique waste management practices for disposal of biological and chemical waste. The Department of Microbiology is exercising extreme care in disposal and recycling of the materials and wastes generated from its laboratories. All non-hazardous liquid chemical wastes are discarded in the common laboratory drain, which are then treated through the common sewage treatment plant (STP). A new STP online monitoring room is constructed for effective liquid waste management.
