Feedback Obtained

The Internal Quality Assurance cell of the College collects feedback from the Alumni and current students every year. It is mandatory for all the students to submit their feedback on parameters relating to Academics, especially Teaching, Leaning and Evaluation. The feedback collected through digital forms require responses that obtain scores on a four-point scale (Very Good, Good, Satisfactory and Unsatisfactory) The questions in the Feedback form pertain to Teaching-Learning and evaluation methods adopted by the departments in the conduct of various courses and Laboratory work. The questions are on the depth of course content, sufficiency of study resources in the Department and Library, Laboratory and/or computing facilities available, extent of coverage of syllabus, communication skills and effectiveness of teaching by the Faculty, Learning methodologies adapted for wholesome education, fairness of evaluation, outcome of study of the courses and their applicability. The data collected through online survey is analyzed by the Faculty of the Department of Statistics of the College. The results presented as graphical representations are submitted to the Management and subsequently presented in the meeting of the Heads of Departments, to make relevant changes in the forthcoming Academic year and decision-making. The feedback collection exercise and analysis is done to improve the Academics to higher level of student-centric teaching, outcomebased learning, and to equip the student community for employment.

4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website)

The College's 320 acre campus with a vast infrastructure, installations and equipment is maintained by the Estate office. The Estate office has policies to carry out both preventive and post maintenance activities. Regular preventive maintenance is carried out through AMCs, and periodic checks of electrical, water installations, equipment, sewage and garbage disposal. Emergencies are attended to ensure the campus life is normal. Normally departments, units, halls, residential staff and students register their maintenance requirement with the Estate office who inturn, attend to all such requirements /grievances regularly. The Estate office functions through the Estate Manager who reports to the Bursar. The Estate Manager is assisted by • Electrical Supervisors • Civil supervisors • Electricians • Carpenters • Plumbers • Clerical assistants • Sanitary workers • Campus workers, Sweepers and Gardeners • Maintenance of rest rooms and cleaning of classrooms and common areas is outsourced. The outsourced housekeeping is carried out by trained personnel. Science laboratories: Laboratories, classrooms and the library are functional from 8 am to 6.15 pm on all working days. There are adequate laboratory assistants for the Science Departments having labs of Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and computer laboratories who take care of the maintenance of labs and equipment placed in the labs. Air conditioners, computers and network facilities are maintained either by annual maintenance contract (AMC) or serviced by agencies/manufacturers as and when need arises. The stock in the labs is verified for the available equipment and damaged ones are discarded. Maintenance of Electrical and Electronic Equipment is checked regularly at the end of every semester. Breakage register is maintained in the laboratories. Library: The Librarian looks after the maintenance of the library books, journals, periodicals, furniture, electronic equipment, computers and software. He coordinates with the Estate Manager and System Administrator to ensure regular maintenance is done. Weeding of books is done on a regularbasis in the general library. Pest Management measures are regularly carried out in the library and in other buildings. Since the Library operates RFID, Inventory Management is made easy through this technology and software. Sports Complex:

State of the art sports Indore Stadium partly funded by UGC was built on campus. The stadium provides one full size basketball court, four shuttle badminton courts and one volley ball court. The stadium is well ventilated and paved with imported wooden floor. The stadium is ideal for conducting both National and International level competitions. Power generation and energy conservation: All buildings are connected through a 1000 kVA transformer and two 250 kVA generators to provide uninterrupted power supply. Two solar power plants with total capacity of 600 kWp generate 90,000 units of electricity every month. All power/electrical installations are under AMC for proper maintenance. 5.3.2 - Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words) The College Union Society (CUS) is a student body that represents the interests of students in College Administration. It is responsible for organizing various student activities. The CUS consists of the student chairman, student secretary, conveners of various portfolios, department representatives and class representatives. The Principal, the President of the CUS, along with a Vice-president and Staff Advisor, who are also faculty members, provide guidance to the student leaders of the CUS. All the student office bearers and representatives are elected by the students through a democratic and transparent process by an independent Election commission. The student chairman and student secretary are also members of the college Senatus, the highest executive body of the College, and many other important committees. This enables the participation of the student community in taking major decisions							

concerning the curricular and cocurricular activities of the College. Every academic Department has a Board of Studies that has student representatives. The College Academic Council which has wide ranging powers to decide upon academic matters also has student representatives. The CUS organizes many noteworthy events throughout the year such as Culturals, Literary Debating events, Theatre, Sports and Academics. Some of the sports events organized by the CUS are meant for the faculty as well. Some of the important events organized by the CUS regularly are given below: College Auditions: The college Auditions seek to identify various talents and abilities of students through a series of competitions focusing on cultural as well as literary and debating events. Aurora: Aurora is a cultural event organized exclusively for the women students of the College. It aims to serve as a platform for women students to display their unique talents and abilities. Theatre Night: Theatre night is an extravagant and high-quality display of drama and theatre in the College, conducted by the CUS. Theatre Night has been the springboard for many students to enter professional theatre career. Deepwoods: Deepwoods is an intercollegiate cultural event organized annually by the CUS. The three-day iconic event attracts participants from various colleges across Chennai and all over the country. It offers an array of exciting events ranging from music to dance, debates and arts. Students generate the funds needed for this event through sponsorship and entrepreneurship and in the process, they hone their administrative and leadership skills. Sports: There are various sporting events organized by the CUS such as the Danis Esau Memorial Inter-collegiate football tournament, Teacher's Day Sports etc. CUS is also involved in many social welfare activities such as organizing blood donation camps and cleaning up the College premise through 'Campus Cleaning Programme'. The CUS has also played a stellar role in collecting and distributing relief material during natural calamities like floods and cyclones. To Conclude, the CUS of MCC is a role model for how student councils should be elected and how they should play a significant and meaningful role in enhancing the quality of a higher

educational institution.

The chapters pay an active role in being a bridge between the local MCC alumni communities across the world and the parent Institution. They periodically organize meetings and get-togethers. The central unit of the MCC Alumni Association organizes many programmes and events throughout the year. The Executive committee of the MCC Alumni Association meets to transact business concerning alumni of the College and also developmental works of their alma mater. Over the years the Association has supported many noble causes of the College. Alumni are also involved in the Board of Directors and Board of Studies. The College itself has a dedicated Alumni and Public Relations Officer headed by an Alumni and Public Relations Officer. Academic Departments of the College, and the Halls of Residence, also conduct periodical alumni reunions. The Institution practices decentralization and participative management in all its activities and initiatives by involving the Deans, Heads of Departments / Units, faculty members and even students at different levels of decisionmaking. The College Union Society is predominantly a student body but includes the President who is the Principal of the College, the Vice-President and a Staff Advisor who are senior Faculty members. Student leaders are elected to various offices including the Chairman, the General Secretary and as leaders of various committees. This body is responsible for conducting various cultural and academic activities in the College. The annual cultural program, Deep Woods is wholly conceptualized, organised and executed through this body. The fact that the Senatus, an important decision-making body of the college, consists of the Chairman, and Secretary of the College Union Society is a testimony to the

effective role of students in the institutional affairs. Department Associations, as bodies constituted with students as office-bearers, also help in the conduct of curricular and extra-curricular activities of respective departments. The process of recruitment is decentralized at various levels. The College advertises the recruitment needs from time to time. The Heads of the Departments and senior faculty from the Department primarily screen the applications. After careful scrutiny, the candidates who satisfies the criteria for recruitment are selected and called for an interview. The members on the Interview panel would consist of the Principal, Bursar, representatives of the Board of Directors, UGC nominee, subject experts from other Colleges and Deans of the College.

Strategy Type	Details
Curriculum Development	The process of curriculum development involves subject experts and individuals with industry experience. The Board of Studies is convened by the Head of the Department and the recommendations are brought to the Academic council for approval. The Departments that brought in changes in their curriculum include the Departments of History, Economics, Chemistry, Geography, Physics (SFS), Microbiology (SFS), Computer Application (SFS) and Visual Communication (SFS). An inter disciplinary course on Philosophy and History of Science was initiated by the Department of Chemistry. The Centre for Peace Studies launched a Diploma Course in Peace and Conflict Studies.
Teaching and Learning	The Institution provides the required facilities to ensure that the teaching and learning methods are effective. LCD Projectors, laptops and software like SPSS and Tally are provided to the Departments. Classrooms are equipped with smart boards and special training is provided to the faculty to use these technologies. Project Based Learning (PBL) has been facilitated in the Departments resulting in synthesizing of new information on the subject domain leading to presentation of papers in conferences.
Examination and Evaluation	The College adopts rules and regulations pertaining to examinations as and when they are introduced by the University of Madras. The double valuation system is followed to ensure fairness in the valuation of papers. The option of submitting question

	papers for the End of Semester examinations through emails was initiated. The remuneration for both the internal and external examiners have been made through Electronic Clearing System.
Research and Development	The College encourages Research Development through the Research Development Deanery. The Faculty is involved in research and development extensively. The Institution has a number of research projects (both minor and major) from Government bodies and Private institutions both in the country and abroad. Faculty members are actively involved in presenting research papers in International and National Conferences organized both within and outside the country. The College allocates annual funds to the Research Development Deanery to provide research grants.
Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation	The Library has been completely revamped in terms of infrastructure and the accessibility of resources. A number of E-resources in the form of books and journals have been added. Various new sections are introduced exclusively for References, competitive exams etc. The library through ICT helps in empowering faculty and students to achieve excellence. An Air- conditioned conference room at the Department of Chemistry was dedicated. The staff room of the Department of Chemistry was refurbished, and a Computation and Instrumentation facility was set up with the support from Department of Science Technology. An elevator for the benefit of the differently abled students and staff was installed. The College has also set up its second green project Sewage Treatment Plant (STP).
Human Resource Management	The Dr. Chandran Devanesan Centre for Human Resource Development conducts various programs from time to time for both students and faculty members. Training programs and workshops on various issues are organized by different Departments regularly thus helping the faculty to stay abreast of the latest developments. Faculty Development workshop on Transactional Analysis was organised. These programs have helped not only in increasing the morale of the faculty members but in

	helping them to adapt to changes in perceptions and technologies.

Internship recruitment with EY, Zoho, Reliance and Hamleys was arranged and students were selected for internship. Besides interactions for placement and internship, various Departments of the College actively collaborate with the Industry to enhance knowledge exchange by way of inviting alumni and eminent persons from the industry for lectures, workshops and conferences.

1. Title of the Practice: Sewage Treatment Plant Objective / Best Practice: STP - Processed to make water fit for irrigation and to recycle water wastage by bringing it into recyclable state. The Context: Green campus - To recycle the waste water being generated in the campus. The Practice: There are six Halls of Residence, Offices, departments and Residences on campus. The waste water that is generated is sent to the Sewage Treatment Plant, where the recycled water is sent out to the farm for irrigation practices. All Campus Sewage is getting recycled with outcome of 3.75 lakh liters of grey water per day apart from manure which is used for farm cultivation purposes. Evidence of Success: The Grey water collected forms good manure for the farm for agriculture. Problems encountered and resources required: Nothing mentionable. 2. Title of the practice: Best Practices established in the Miller Memorial Library Objective/ Best Practice: Supporting agency for academic learning and class room teaching. The Context: Fulfils the intellectual needs of the academic community/users and provides information service to the end user. The Practices: Library is fully automated since 2012. INSPROPLUS (Library Management Software) has been installed with the following five main modules of the library in-house operations. (Acquisition System, Cataloguing System, Circulation System (Issue, Return and Renewals) Serials Control System, OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) URKUND anti-plagiarism software has been installed in the Library for the evaluation process of M.Phil. Ph.D. Thesis. A one day 'Online training (EBSCO)' for Research Scholars and staff of our College was organized on 26th February 2018. The timing of Library for students has been extended as 8.00 a.m. to 7.00 p.m. Regular Information Literacy programs (INFLIBNET N-List and EBSCO) Orientation Programmes are organized. Complete safety is ensured with Surveillance cameras (CCTV / Fire Extinguishers). Free Internet access centre for students and faculty is available in the Library. Digital Library comprises various E-Database such as EBSCO, N-LIST, DELNET, QUESTIA and NDLI. Regular New Arrivals Display / New Books Added Alert, Library Happenings Alert using Social Media are done. In-House/remote access to e-resources (Links to National Digital Library and other subscribed e- resources is available. Research Carrels, Competitive Examinations Collection Corner, Anti - Plagiarism Software (URKUND) - For detecting, preventing and handling plagiarism, photocopy facility are also available. Radio-Frequency Identification (RFID) facility in the Library was dedicated on 26th September 2018. "Earn while Learn Scheme' for Students has been introduced which is very helpful for the students who are in need. Academic Excellence: Madras Christian College is a green campus comprising

about 360 acres, having rich vegetation and varied fauna. It has good infrastructure facility with adequate residential facilities for students and staff. A farm, an infirmary along with other related amenities are there that contribute to the sustenance of the Excellent Status of the Institution in academics. Madras Christian College obtained the 13th position in the category of 'Arts and Science Colleges' in the country, (NIRF) 2019. According to 'India Today' ranking of Colleges, MCC was ranked 4th position in Science, and 5th position in Arts in India and No.1 in Chennai for the second consecutive year. As per 'The Week' ranking 2019, MCC was ranked 5th position in Arts and 6th position in Science in India. Our College has received the 'Higher Education Excellence Award - 2019' Arts Science Colleges, Chennai, from the Staffordshire University, UK and Education Matters, on 23rd July 2019. The College has received 'ThinkEdu Award for Excellence in Education', from the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu, on 9th January 2020. Our College has been granted Extension of Autonomous Status for the period from 2019-2020 to 2023-2024 including ex-post-facto approval from the period 2018-2019 by the University Grants Commission, New Delhi. MCC has been re-accredited and awarded 'A' Grade for a period of five years from October 2019 to October 2024. Serving Humanity: Lion Dr P. Sivaraj Memorial Award has been awarded to Madras Christian College by the Lions Club of Central Madras, on 25th May 2019 for propagating, encouraging and organizing Voluntary Blood Donation Camps for many years. The College has been awarded the "Best College for Tourism Education in Tamil Nadu" on 11th April 2019 at Tamil Nadu Tourism Awards - 2019, as it serves the neighbouring people. Social Relevance: The Centre for Peace Studies has launched a Diploma Course in 'Peace and Conflict Studies' on 19th August 2019 for the benefit of students and the local community. MCC Pulicat Community College (MCC PCC) was commenced on 11th October 2019 at Estuarine Biological Laboratory premises, Pulicat, Ponneri Taluk, with two Diploma Programmes (Diploma in Healthcare and Diploma in Computer Hardware Services). Infrastructure Facility: Infrastructure facilities have been added on to the college to improve scientific discussions for faculty and students. An Airconditioned Conference Room in the Science Block was dedicated on 20th April 2019. The Staff Room of the Department of Chemistry was refurbished and dedicated on 20th April 2019. Prof. Edward Barnes Computation and Instrumentation Facility (PEBCIF) in the Department of Chemistry was dedicated on 16th August 2019. An Elevator, for the benefit of the differently abled students and staff, was dedicated on 30th April 2019. Our College has launched setting up of its second green project Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) and the ground breaking ceremony in the College Farm was held on 6th March 2019.
