REV. ROBERT IOHNSTON

Rev. Robert Johnston was a dear friend of Rev. John Anderson, He was born at Craigie Burn, a farm near Moffat, on December 16, 1807. His parents were Robert Johnston and Janet Gillespie. He was educated at the parish school of Moffat and became a scholar of Latin and arithmetic. He went to College in Edinburgh in 1827 and graduated in 1828-29. Before coming to Madras, Rev. Johnston worked as a tutor for individuals and in a few institutions. He also laboured among the poor and spreading the knowledge of the gospel. He was licenced to preach the gospel by the Edinburgh Presbytery on November 25, 1835. When there was a need for a second teacher in Madras, the Committee appointed Rev. Johnston as a missionary to Madras. On 1839. Johnston reached January Madras. Throughout his journey, he acquired knowledge about Hindustani and Tamil alphabets. While writing about Rev. Johnston's coming, Rev Anderson says that "my friend has come unchanged with a Scotch energy which refreshes my heart". Soon Rev. Anderson founded the branch school at Kancheepuram and entrusted the administration of the central school in the safe hands of Rev. Johnston. When financial aid was forthcoming, Johnston along with Anderson took efforts to raise financial resources for the institution. He raised Rs. 1260 and purchased an old house for the institution. Apart from Kancheepuram, Rev. Johnston helped the mission found the branch schools in Chenglepet and Nellore as well as promote female education. While Rev. Anderson was away. spearheaded the mission in Madras which took a toll on his health. After twelve years of service in Madras, he finally departed for home due to poor health conditions. He died in March, 1853.

Rev. Johnston was a man of pure principle and was deeply loved by his pupils. In recognition of his service, his students collected a large sum for his portrait, which is today placed in the College.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF MADRAS CHRISTIAN COLLEGE

Madras Christian College traces its origin to the General Assembly School founded by the Rev. John Anderson, a Missionary from the Church of Scotland on 3rd April 1837. Anderson was a pioneer in introducing English medium education in South He was ably assisted by Rev. Johnston, Rev. Braidwood and Margaret Locher Anderson. Rev. William Miller who arrived in 1862 upgraded the school to a college by adding F.A. and B.A. courses in 1865 and 1867. Along with a few other protestant missions in Madras, Miller transformed the institution and named it 'Madras Christian College' on 1st January 1877, Miller's bold academic vision, supported by the generous contribution from his family members, old students and the Madras Government, raised the most impressive array of college buildings and hostels (student homes) opposite the High Court complex. Miller was succeeded by worthy leaders such as Professors Skinner, E.M. Macphail, Meston and Hogg.

The rapid expansion of the College and the congested physical space necessitated the shifting of the college from George Town to the 390 acre sylvan Selaiyur forest in Tambaram. The 'great migration' took place on 30th January 1937 with a thanksgiving service in which the Governor Lord Erskine participated. Professor Edward Barnes and his wife Alice Barnes, who lived on the campus since 1932, painstakingly shaped and nurtured the campus, by planting hundreds of rare plants, and carving out dusty roads. Swiss Architect Mr Henry Schaetti designed the majestic main buildings. The College hosted

the famous International Missionary Conference in 1938. Women students were admitted from 1939.

Rev. Dr Alexander Boyd, who was the Principal for 18 long years (1938-'56) further shaped the character and ethos of the College. He was ably assisted by a host of European and Indian faculty.

Rev. J.R. Macphail was the last of the Scottish Principals to have served the College between 1956 and 1962.

A new era dawned in 1962 (125th Year of MCC), when Dr Chandran Devanesen took over as the first Indian Principal, who further enriched the academic stature of the College and broadened the scope of the educational process by taking it to the neighbourhood. Dr Devanesen's successors have each contributed in their own way to the growth and development of the Institution

The year 1978 was path-breaking as MCC became one of the earliest colleges to be granted the status of Autonomy. This status enabled the College to introduce new courses, innovative curricular changes in tune with changing times, and examination reforms with focus on learner-centred continuous assessments. Autonomy also enabled the College to introduce Diploma and Certificate courses through the School of Continuing Education. The College also introduced vocational degree programmes in the Departments of History, Zoology and Commerce in 1994.

The **Self-Financed Stream** was started in 1999. Degree programmes of contemporary relevance and employability are offered in the Self-Financed

Stream. The College now has thirty-two departments under both the Aided and Self-Financed Streams offering Undergraduate, Postgraduate and Research programmes (M.Phil. & Ph.D.).

The Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) was introduced in 2003–2004 enabling the College to provide more choice for the students, especially interdisciplinary options and rationalized the workload of each paper in tune with the credits awarded.

The Halls of residence for men - Selaiyur, St Thomas's and Bishop Heber; and the Halls of residence for women - Martin, Margaret and Barnes, contribute to the rich diversity and vibrancy of the campus life. The sprawling sports fields as well as the cultural ambience of the college provide impetus towards students' personality and their all-round development.

All key milestones in the history of the college were befittingly celebrated. The 50th year i.e. 1887 witnessed the birth of Philosophy and History Unions, besides the Tamil and Telugu Associations. The centenary of the College celebrated in 1937 was marked with the relocation of the College to the Tambaram Campus. In 1962 (125th Year) Dr S. Radhakrishnan, our distinguished alumnus, visited the College as the Vice-President of India and the MCC School as the President of India. The 150th year was commemorated in 1987, with the Prime Minister Shri Rajiv Gandhi participating in the main function and declaring open the Miller Memorial Library. Dr A.P.J. Abdul Kalam, the then President of India lent his gracious presence at the 170th year celebrations in 2007 and inaugurated the Centre for International Social Work.

The Quartoseptcentennial (175th) was celebrated in the year 2012. Shri. Mohammad Hamid Ansari, Vice President of India, Prof. P.J. Kurien, Deputy Chairman of Rajya Sabha and Dr K. Rosaiah, Governor of Tamil Nadu graced the occasion. "Celebrating History and Serving Humanity" was the theme of the Quartoseptcentennial year. 100 kWp Solar Power Plant, Commerce Block and IGH Extension wing marked some of the 175th year celebration activities. In the year 2013, the College was reaccredited by NAAC with A Grade (Highest Grade). In 2016 the College was awarded the status of 'College with Potential for Excellence'. The College was ranked 17th in India by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) in 2020.

Madras Christian College established the 'MCC Boyd-Tandon School of Business' in 2016, which aims to offer world class business education.

The College is first among the Arts and Science colleges in the state of Tamil Nadu in meeting the Solar Purchase obligation, as it generates 50 per cent of its power needs through solar energy.

The MCC-MRF Innovation Park was inaugurated on 17th March 2021. Being one of its kinds among Arts and Science Colleges in India, this landmark project funded by MRF Ltd. can host many contemporary laboratories and collaborative spaces for Students which will enable them to come up with innovative ideations resulting in start-ups.

The College with its rich history of Research, embarked into the world of Innovations and entrepreneurship through the launching of the MCC Institution's Innovation Council (MCC IIC),

MCC Research Colloquium (MCC RC) and MCC Entrepreneurship Development Cell (MCC EDC) and MCC Ideation Club during the year 2020. The Best Innovators Award was introduced in the following year to encourage the Staff members and Students to engage themselves in active research leading to Innovation.

Prof Edward Barnes Tree Plantation Drive which began in 2020, re-emphasized the preservation of the green cover on campus. Many students were driven with enthusiasm to the newly formed MCC Wildlife Conservation Club and MCC NDLI club.

New Undergraduate Programmes such as B.Com. (Professional Accounting), B.Sc. Psychology and B.Sc. Hospitality & Tourism were introduced, apart from the revival of B.A. History (Vocational) programme specializing in Archaeology & Museology.

A historic funding by the MRF Ltd. in the year 2021 led to the establishment of the MCC-MRF Innovation Park which is the first of its kind in the Arts and Science Colleges in India.

MCC spontaneously responded to the global pandemic viz. Covid-19 through its MCC Covid Task Force which reached out to the unreached during the neediest time. The MCC Covid19 Telecounselling Centre was established through a fruitful collaboration with the District Administration. The College received the IMA Tambaram Doctors' Day Award 2021 for its yeoman services to the society during the Pandemic.

MCC was recognized by the Senate of Serampore

to be an Examination Centre for the Bachelor of Christian Studies Programme of the Serampore College.

The year 2022 witnessed the Dedication of the Meston Centre for Teaching and Learning, MCC-MRF Innovation Park Prototype, Renovated Children's Park and Research Scholars Chamber. The MCC Community College was recognized as a Training Centre by the National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC). Research Paper Publication Awards for Faculty, Scholars and Students was introduced. B.Sc. Computer Science Programme was introduced under SFS.

Academic excellence, spiritual vitality and social relevance have remained the guiding principles of the Institution down the decades

COURSE STRUCTURE

Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)

The introduction of the CBCS in 2003-'04 ensures compatibility with the academic norms practiced in similar institutions in India and abroad. The Government of Tamil Nadu proposed a common structure under CBCS to be implemented by Government, Government Aided and Self-Financed Colleges across Tamil Nadu from the academic year 2008-2009.

CBCS at the Undergraduate Level

The structure of undergraduate courses under the CBCS in the semester pattern provides a wide range of courses for students to choose, based on their aptitude and career goals. The undergraduate curriculum includes the following categories of courses in order to accomplish a holistic approach to undergraduate education. The 3 year - 6 semester curriculum has the following components:

- Part I Tamil or any other language (Telugu, Malayalam, Kannada, Hindi, Sanskrit, French, German) is offered in the first four semesters except for B.Com. where it is offered in the first two semesters only. Students are required to take the same language as they opted for XII Std.
- Part II **English** is offered in the first four semesters except for B.Com. where it is offered in the first two semesters only.
- Part III **Major papers** (including practical and project work) and **Allied papers** are offered by each of the departments with a

number of innovative and contemporary courses. Allied courses are designed to complement the major courses of study. The compulsory allied courses are decided by the department. The optional allied courses are chosen by students from a list of three allied subjects specified by departments.

- Part IV **Non-major courses** listed below are offered under this category, during the first two semesters only.
 - (a.1) Basic Tamil (BT) Those who have not studied Tamil up to XII standard and have taken a non-Tamil Language under Part I shall take Basic Tamil.
 - (a.2) Advanced Tamil (AT) Those who have studied Tamil up to XII standard and have taken a non-Tamil language under Part I shall take Advanced Tamil.
 - (a.3) General Course (GC) Students who do not come under (a.1) or (a.2) shall opt for General Course. This Course encompasses topics of introduction to each major discipline. Students may choose to study anyone other than those offered by their Department.
 - (b) Skill-Based Courses Personality Development (PD), Inter-disciplinary Elective (IDE), General Elective (GE) and Computer Training Programmes are offered in 3rd, 4th and 5th semesters. An Inter-Disciplinary Elective and a General

Elective are offered by each department to impart skill-based learning experience, thus providing an opportunity to gain knowledge in an application-oriented subject.

(c) Environmental Studies – The Environmental Studies Course (under Part IV) offered by the College is enriched with Experiential Learning Modules and Practical Tasks taken up in the Sylvan Campus of MCC. Students of both the aided and self-financed streams will be undergoing this course during their Second Year. Students from the Humanities and Social Sciences will be having Environmental Studies Course during semester III, while Students from the Sciences will have it in Semester IV.

The Internal Continuous Assessment test marks will be slightly different from the Core Subjects. ICA 1 and ICA 3 are theory based tests, while ICA 2 will be project based. Submission of Report and viva voce examination are the integral part of this project based ICA 2, which is mandatory. Average of ICA will be calculated with project component (ICA 2) as compulsory component, and the best of two other exams (ICA 1 / ICA 3) will be considered.

However, End of Semester Examination will be for 100 Marks (only theory) following the common question paper template prescribed by the College. For more details on ICA 2, refer the syllabus.

(d) Value Education – This is a valueoriented, interdisciplinary compulsory programme, which is a part of the Foundation Course offered to all I year Undergraduate students.

The Programme is divided into:

- (i) Social Ethics For all I UG students in Semester I.
- (ii-a) Christian Studies For all I UG Christian Students which is also open to others in Semester II.

(or)

(ii-b) Social studies or Gender studies for all other I UG students in Semester II.

Part V – Extension Activities - It is mandatory for students to take part in any of the following extension activities – Service Learning - Physical Education/ Department Association Activities / NCC / NSS / Innovators' Club / Scrub Society.

Students must register for the following courses, as applicable, a week before the re-opening of the semester. No changes will be entertained after the students register their choice of subject.

Those who join must continue for three years. Incentives for Cadets:

- Bonus marks for higher studies and Government jobs.
- Preference in the selection for State / Central Uniformed Services.
- Direct commission as officers in the Indian Defence Service.

Innovators' Club

Innovators' Club is an optional extension activity under Part V of the UG curriculum. The student who chooses and joins in this extension activity must continue for 3 years, and should be an active

participant in all the activities of the club. The student shall choose to be a part of this club from the first semester of their UG programme. The innovators' club is an activity-based curricular module, supported and organized by the MCC-Institution's Innovation Council, MCC-Entrepreneurship Development Cell and MCC-MRF innovation Park (MMIP). This module aims to take the students through a series of activities including in-house and invited lectures and demonstrations, bootcamps, field/industry/ incubator visits, interaction with entrepreneurs and start-ups, and support and mentoring from MMIP. The students will be oriented on innovation and entrepreneurship culture of the college during the first semester, and various components including concepts of ideation and design thinking, innovation, proposal making, pitching, prototype development and process validation, and grant opportunities will be introduced to them during the three years in a staggered manner. The outcome of this module will be to make the students understand the concept of innovation and entrepreneurship, and help them to develop entrepreneurial skills and establish startups through a guided support system.

EXAMINATION

University of Madras Guidelines for completion of UG and PG degree programmes for the batch of students admitted to the course with effect from 2018-2019.

- A student who, for whatever reason, is not able to complete the programme within the normal period (N) or the Minimum duration prescribed for the programme, may be allowed two years period beyond the normal period to clear the backlog to be qualified for the degree. (Time Span = N + 2 years for the completion of programme).
- In exceptional cases such as major accidents and child birth, an extension of one year be considered beyond maximum span of time (Time Span = N + 2 + 1 year for the completion of programme).
- Students qualifying during the extended period shall not be eligible for RANKING.

Internal Continuous Assessment (ICA)

The Internal Continuous Assessment (ICA) and End of Semester Examination (ESE), each carrying 50% marks, form the basis for grading student performance in each paper. The passing minimum in ESE is 20/50 for UG and 25/50 for PG programmes.

a) ICA Theory

Internal Continuous Assessment tests for theory will be centrally administered by the College through the Examination Office. Three tests will be conducted for each theory paper - two written tests and an assessment of accepted innovative components such as a seminar, term paper, project, assignment, portfolio, power-point presentation, quiz, objective test, etc or a combination of the above, as decided by the course teacher or HoD (The programme of such evaluation will be fixed before the commencement of that semester in consultation with the respective Academic Deans). Each test will carry a maximum of 50 marks and the lowest of the three tests will be ignored. The Timetable for the ICA tests I and III will be scheduled and notified by the Examination Office in the College Calendar. ICA II based on innovative techniques will span over the entire duration of the semester.

b) ICA Practical

Three tests will be conducted for each practical paper. The Time table will be scheduled by the course teacher or HoD.

Re-test is not allowed except for the students who had represented the College in sports or cultural activities on the dates of the scheduled ICA tests or for students with any justifiable reason acceptable to the Principal. The Principal may grant special

permission to such candidates for taking one additional test of three hours duration encompassing the entire syllabus of that paper. This test should be taken before the commencement of the End of Semester Examination of that semester. A record of such assessment procedure will be maintained by the department and is open for clarification by students. Students have the right to appeal to the Principal in case of glaring disparities in valuation.

Major Guidelines for ICA Retake, ICA Repeat and Repeat Semester

a) ICA Retake

This regulation is being implemented from the academic year 2010–2011 and extends to all students currently studying I, II & III year UG courses and I & II year PG courses.

ICA Retake will be centrally administered by the **Examinations Office.**

Eligibility for ICA retake is as follows:

- Minimum 10 marks in ICA
- Passing minimum in ESE is 20/50 for UG & 25/50 for PG
- Fulfilment of attendance requirements
- No improvement in ICA Retake

Further, a student

- · can attempt only once
- can appear for papers of any semester during the course period
- can appear for a maximum of only **six** papers in a semester.

b) ICA Repeat

ICA Repeat can be availed by all UG and PG students to improve their marks after the completion

of the course in any semester, subject to the following conditions

- The students must register for ICA Repeat, by contacting the Dean of Student Affairs within a month of the commencement of a semester.
- A student is permitted to appear for a maximum of only ten papers in a semester
- The students should take the tests during the ICA schedule.

Eligibility for ICA Repeat is as follows:

- Marks: No minimum marks in ICA and ESE are required to avail this facility.
- Attendance: The student should not have lack of attendance.

c) Repeat Semester

Students who do not have adequate attendance and those who missed a semester will have to register for Repeat Semester after completion of the course. These students will have to attend classes, compensate for loss of attendance and appear for the ICA along with the regular students. Odd semester students can apply only for the odd semester and even semester students can apply only for the even semester.

The ICA Repeat and Repeat Semester registrations are administered by the **Dean of Student Affairs** and conducted by the respective Departments. Students have to contact the Dean of Student Affairs **before the commencement of the semester** to register for Repeat Semester.

End of Semester Examination (ESE)

- a) The academic year is divided into two semesters, the first from June/July to November/December and the second from November/December to April/May. Each semester will have a minimum of 90 working days excluding study holidays and examination days. Examinations will be conducted in courses of all semesters in Nov/ Dec and April/May every year for all UG and PG courses.
- b) The schedule for ESE Practicals will be notified by the Controller of Examinations.
- c) A student who fails in one or more courses in any semester will be permitted to reappear for the same at the subsequent End of Semester Examination, subject to the student fulfilling the attendance requirement. A student whose attendance falls short of 50% will be required to repeat that semester by enrolling again at the end of the course. Course work set for each examination will follow the regulations and syllabi in force at the time.
- d) To qualify for the UG/PG Degree, supplementary candidates are required to pass in all the courses prescribed for the programme within six/four semesters immediately after the completion of the programme. Beyond that period, the candidates will follow the current syllabus for the examinations. A late fee per year for each course shall be levied.
- e) Examination Fees will be levied as per the University rates. A special fee is collected for supplementary papers. Only those students who obtain 'No dues' clearance from the Bursar's

Office/Hall/Departments are eligible to obtain the Hall Ticket for the End of Semester Examinations.

Grading System (from 2011 onwards)

- Passing minimum for UG programme is 40% of marks in the End of Semester Examination and 40% of the total marks in the Internal Continuous Assessment and End of Semester Examination put together in each course.
- Passing minimum for PG programme is 50% of the marks in the End of Semester Examination and 50% of the total marks in the Internal Continuous Assessment and End of Semester Examination put together in each course.

(i) Three year UG Programme : 140

(ii) Two year PG Programme : 100

Passing of Results

Results are passed by the Board of Examiners of the departments concerned and submitted to the Academic Council of the College for approval after which the Principal recommends the eligible students for award of the Degrees to the University of Madras.

Provision to Appeal

Appeals against results of the End of Semester Examination may be sent to the Controller of Examinations by the student concerned within seven days of the publication of the results. Only UG students who have secured 20% of marks or more and PG students who have secured 30% of marks or more in the End of Semester Examinations are eligible to apply for revaluation. Appeal for each course should be made separately. A fee of Rs.750/will be charged for each course under appeal. The appeals will be scrutinized and approved by the Appeals Committee, whose decision shall be final.

Providing Photocopy of the Revaluated Answer Script of End of Semester Examinations from the Academic year 2022 – 2023 onwards

Revaluation: All current batch students who will be appearing for their Semester Examinations are eligible for Revaluation of their answer scripts.

Photocopy of the answer scripts: Students who will be applying for revaluation can obtain the Photocopy of the Answer Script with marks after fifteen days from the date of publication of the revaluation results.

Revaluation Fee: Rs. 750/- per course

Fee for Photocopy of the answer scripts: Rs. 250/- per course (Optional)

Instant Examination

UG and PG students appearing in the Final Semester ESE will be permitted to take Instant Examination immediately after the publication of the Examination Results, in the event of their being unsuccessful in the Final Semester Exams, subject to the following conditions:

- Instant Examination can be taken only in the theory paper belonging to the Final Semester.
- 2. Students will be permitted to take only **one theory course** belonging to the final semester.
- 3. The students should not have any other arrear,

other than the course for which he/she seeks Instant exam

Regulations for M.Phil. Programme

The duration of M.Phil. Programme shall be one year consisting of two semesters for the full-time students and two years consisting of four semesters for the part-time students.

- The programme will commence in the month of August for each academic year.
- 2. For full-time candidates, the End of Semester Examination for theory papers shall be conducted at the end of the first semester during the month of February and after the completion of those theory courses, the candidate is eligible to submit the dissertation before 31st August of every year.
- 3. For part-time candidates, the End of Semester Examination for theory papers shall be conducted in the month of August and after the completion of those theory courses, the candidate is eligible to submit the dissertation not earlier than twelve months from the date of commencement of the second year.
- 4. The passing minimum for M. Phil. programme is 50% of the marks in the End of Semester Examinations and 50% of the total marks in the Internal Continuous Assessments and End of Semester Examinations put together.
- Candidates shall submit the Dissertation to the Controller of Examinations through their M.Phil. Supervisor and Head of the Department.
- 6. The distribution of credits is as follows: Minimum two Core courses carrying 5 credits each and an Elective carrying 5 credits (or) three

- Core Courses carrying 15 credits and Dissertation carrying 21 Credits.
- 7. Students must complete the M.Phil. programme (Course work and dissertation/thesis submission) within 3 years from the year of admission (that is N + 2 years). No extension will be given beyond two years of completion of the programme.
- 8. The last date for submission of dissertation shall be 31st August every year without penalty. Those who do not submit the dissertation in time may be given an extension of a maximum of two months with a penal fee prescribed by the University (i.e. up to 31st October). There shall be no further extension of time beyond this period. Any student failing to submit the dissertation within this period will be permitted to submit the dissertation only in the next academic year along with the subsequent batch of students.

CODE OF CONDUCT

Preamble

This Code of Conduct in Madras Christian College (Autonomous) (hereinafter referred to as the 'institution') demands that all the students enrolling with the Institution in order to pursue varied courses both in the main campus as well as in the allied units of the satellite campus shall abide by the rules and regulations given below. It shall apply to all kinds of conduct of students on the Campus, Halls of Residence, Institution or Hall sponsored activities, On Campus/ Off- Campus events.

The primary objective of the Institution in enforcing the Code is to provide a safe and congenial learning climate, and also to administer student's disciplinary process that is egalitarian and effectual to provide a system which promotes student's progress through individual and collective responsibility.

All the students are requested to be well conversant with this Code given below:

- Students are expected to maintain proper behaviour, decorum, etiquette and also to respect the rights of all others in person and property.
- Students are expected to wear ID cards issued by the Institution while in the Campus.
- Unable to produce the identity card, issued by the Institution, or refusing to produce it on demand by the faculty members or the campus security guards will be dealt with seriously.
- Students are expected to be punctual in attending their classes and in all the course work assigned to them.

- Students are expected to respect the right and dignity of the teachers / officers of the institution in expressing his / her opinion.
- The student shall be regular and must complete his/her studies in the Institution. (Refer to Attendance Policy of the Institution)
- All the students are expected to attend/participate
 in all the guest lectures, seminars, conferences,
 workshops, webinars and group Discussions
 and department association meetings organized
 by their respective departments / institution
 without fail. Attendance in respect of the abovementioned activities is obligatory for all students.
- Regular absenteeism, non-completion of course work / assignment and absenting for guest lectures / seminars / conferences / workshops and Internal Continuous Assessment Tests will be dealt with seriously.
- Use of Cell phones either inside the classrooms or on the corridors is strictly prohibited except with the consent of the respective teachers.
- Use of motorized vehicles in the campus is prohibited.
- Motorized vehicles of the students should be parked only in the allotted space near the main gate.
- No student shall organize any picnic, tour or other similar activities without the consent and supervision of the Head of the Department.
- Any change of address or phone number of the student / parent shall be communicated to the office of the Dean of Student Affairs immediately.
- · Any student found loitering on campus during

- class hours or indulging in physical violence or using derogatory / abusive words against fellow students or faculty members, will be treated as acts of grave indiscipline, resulting in immediate suspension / expulsion from the institution.
- All the students are expected to dress appropriately and modestly for the learning environment. Any clothing that degrades dignity of individuals or groups of students is to be avoided.
- Students are expected to be dressed in formals or semi- formals which is appropriate for an educational institution.
- Any attire that is transparent or revealing or obscene is strictly banned on campus.
- The college shows zero tolerance towards any kind of ragging in any form that causes inconvenience to the students of our college either on campus or off-campus or in the Halls of Residence. Ragging of any sort will entail immediate expulsion from the institution. (Refer to Anti-Ragging Policy of the Institution).
- Smoking of tobacco products, possession or consumption of alcohol and possession or consumption of other narcotics are strictly prohibited in the campus, including Halls of residence. (Refer to Anti-Narcotic Policy of the Institution given in the website).
- No student shall indulge in sexual misconduct or harassment in any form. (Refer to Anti-Sexual Harassment Policy of the Institution given in the website).
- Public display of physical intimacy in campus will lead to severe disciplinary action.

- No student shall organize any events / activities / meetings with any outside group / organization without the written permission / consent from the Head of the Institution / Deans.
- Students are expected to use the social media carefully and responsibly. They cannot post derogatory comments about other individuals from the Institution on the social media or indulge in any such related activities having grave ramifications on the reputation of the Institute.
- No student shall share video / audio clippings / or any written content relating to the institution or the halls of residence to any form of media without prior permission of the concerned authorities.
- Intentionally damaging or destroying Institution's property or property of other students and/ or faculty members or any other officers of the institution will be dealt with severely.
- Any troublesome activity in classrooms or in the Halls of Residence / in an event / function sponsored by the Institution or by the Halls of Residence will be dealt with severely.
- Any form of misconduct at the time of student body elections conducted by the institution or the halls of residence will be dealt with severely.
- Theft or unauthorized access to the resources of the institution/ department/ halls of residence/ resident faculty members or staff members will be dealt with severely.
- Engaging in disorderly, lewd, or indecent conduct either in the campus or in the halls of residence will be dealt with severely.

 The Principal shall have the authority to suspend / expel any student from the institution if the student is found to be guilty of any serious misconduct.

Jurisdiction

The Institution shall have the jurisdiction over the conduct of the students associated / enrolled within the main campus as well as the allied units of the satellite campus and to take cognisance of all acts of misconduct on campus / off-campus / in Halls of Residence / in connection with the Institution or activities, events and functions related to the Halls of Residence.

Breach of Code of Conduct

If there is a complaint against the student for the breach of any one or more of the codes of conduct mentioned above, it will be referred to the respective Cell or the Committee namely, Disciplinary Action Committee, Anti-Ragging Cell, Internal Complaints Committee or Anti-Narcotic Cell. The respective Cell or the Committee shall enquire into the alleged breach of the code of conduct and appropriate action will be recommended to the Head of the institution.

Students' Participation

All the students are required to read, understand and abide by this code of conduct for their own safety, security and welfare. The students are obliged to abide by the rules and regulations, concerning discipline, attendance, etc. of the Institution, and also follow the Code of Conduct prescribed for the Students of the Institution, as in force from time to time.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Attendance Regulations

A new Attendance ERP has been developed, with three unique portals - for Head of Departments, Faculty, Students & their Parents/Guardians respectively. Students, Parents/Guardian would be able to monitor their attendance status every day. Attendance notification will be displayed periodically in the Department.

- · Attendance will be calculated on hourly basis.
- If a student is absent for an hour, he/she will lose attendance for that hour.
- Based on the number of hours present, percentage of attendance will be calculated to decide the category in which the student falls for the eligibility to appear for the End of Semester Examinations.
- Attendance is compulsory for all the hours including GC / BT / AT / ID / EVS / GE / PD / Soft Skills/Language and Part II English.

Attendance Notification

The attendance details will be displayed on the respective Department Notice Boards and in the College website once in every 30 days. Clarifications, if any, regarding attendance should be sought from the Dean of Student Affairs / Director (SFS) within three days of publication of the Attendance notification. Percentage of attendance for those who joined late will be calculated from the date of joining the programme.

Category I

Each student is required to have a minimum of 75%

attendance for appearing in the End of Semester Examinations (Theory and Practical).

Category II

If a Student fails to earn the minimum attendance (Percentage stipulated), the Principal shall condone the shortage of attendance up to a maximum limit of 10% (i.e. between 65% and above and less than 75%) after collecting the prescribed fee of Rs.250/each for Theory/Practical examination separately, towards the condonation of shortage of attendance.

Obtaining condonation is not a matter of right. However, the Principal may condone shortage of 35% of attendance for a semester, only for a student with attendance of 65% and above and less than 75%. A student can avail condonation only once during the course of study.

Category III

Students who have less than 65% but more than 50% of attendance are NOT ELIGIBLE for condonation of shortage of attendance and such students will not be permitted to appear for the regular examinations.

However, they will be allowed to proceed to the next semester of the Programme. The Student will be allowed to write those papers as arrears in the subsequent End of Semester Examinations. A student can avail this additional provision only once during the programme.

Category IV

Students who have less than 50% of attendance shall be permitted to proceed to the next semester and complete the programme of study. Such Students shall have to repeat the semester, which they have missed, by re-joining after completion of

final semester of the Programme, by paying the fee for the break of study period as prescribed by the College.

V. Condonation of shortage of attendance for married women students (Category V)

With regard to married women students undergoing UG programmes, the minimum attendance for condonation (Theory / Practical) shall be relaxed and prescribed as 55% instead of 65% if they conceive during their academic career. Medical certificate from the Doctor (D.G.O) attached to a Government Hospital and the prescribed fee of Rs.250/- thereof together with the attendance details shall be forwarded to the Principal to consider the condonation of attendance, mentioning the category.

Zero Percent (0%) Attendance

The Students, who have earned 0% of attendance, have to repeat the course (by re-joining) without proceeding to succeeding semester and they have to obtain prior permission from the University of Madras immediately in order to re-join the programme.

Leave of Absence as On Duty (OD)

1. The Staff-in-charge (eg: Physical Director, Vice President (CUS), NCC Officers, NSS Officers, HoDs, Wardens, other Unit heads etc.) are authorized to send the list of students who participate in events outside the College three days before the commencement of the event(s) to the Dean of Student Affairs (DSA) and also send the attendance / participation certificate not later than three days after the event. It is the responsibility of the student concerned to submit

the form in the prescribed format to the DSA within the stipulated time. On Duty letters will not be entertained at a later date.

Students should periodically check their Attendance ERP for their Attendance/OD updates, and discrepancies, if any, should be brought to the notice of the Office of the Dean of Student Affairs within three days of the occurrence of the discrepancy.

2. A. General On Duty (OD)

For Students in NCC/NSS/Sports/CUS / Halls / Departments / SCM / IIC / Choir / Tamil Peravai / Scrub Society / Wildlife Conservation Club etc., a maximum of 10 Days of OD per Semester will be sanctioned by the Dean of Student Affairs, on behalf of the Principal on perusal of the details provided in the OD Form.

B. Special Purpose On Duty

Students seeking OD beyond the permissible number of days mentioned in 2.A, shall apply to the Principal, through their respective Departments / Unit Heads, prior to the event, for approval.

- 3. For NCC/NSS/Sports etc., preferably all camps should be organized during vacations. The Unit Heads are required to produce necessary document(s) pertaining to the student participation in their unit activities, including blood donation and collection of uniform from Head Quarters. Any special requests other than the above should be referred to the Principal.
- **4. Joining Report:** Any student availing OD for events outside the College, should submit a

Joining Report within three days of availing such OD, along with the necessary attendance certificates, event certificates, etc.

5. Sports Attendance: For Sports Attendance, kindly refer to the Sports Attendance Policy given in the College Website.

ANTI-RAGGING POLICY OF THE INSTITUTION

Ragging is completely banned on campus and off campus. The college shows zero tolerance towards any kind of ragging in any form, which will cause inconvenience to the students of our college either on campus or off-campus or in the Halls of Residence. The college is conscious of the fact that RAGGING is prohibited by law. It is a non-bailable criminal offense.

The college takes upon itself to preserve the campus and its students from indulging in any of the activities listed below as ragging in accordance with the UGC regulations in curbing menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions 2009:

- Any conduct by any student whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student.
- Indulging in rowdy or indisciplined activity by any student which causes or likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any student.
- Asking any student to do any act that generates a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the Physique or psyche of a fresher or any student.

- Exploiting the services of a fresher for completing the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.
- Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden laid on a fresher or any student
- Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene, lewd acts and gestures causing physical harm.
- Any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, posts, public insults which would also include deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture to fresher's or any student.
- 8. Any act that affects the mental health, dignity and self-confidence of a fresher / any student with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure, or to show off power, exercise authority over a fresher/ any student.
- Any act that prevents disrupts and disturbs the regular academic activity of a fresher / student.
- 10. Each and every student is expected to carry himself/herself with dignity.

Department Tours

Educational tours may be organized either for a class or for the entire department. A maximum of two working days will be permitted for such tours. Students should be accompanied by two staff members of whom one should be a woman staff member or wife of a staff member if women students are part of the tour. Prior approval of the Principal must be sought with all the details and justification before making any arrangements for the tour.

As per government regulations, educational tours must be organized for educational purposes only. Permission should be obtained from RJDCE for educational tours within Tamil Nadu and from DCE for tours outside the state. A proposal should be sent to the concerned authority with curriculum/syllabus as justification for the tour, letter of consent, and declaration from the parent/guardian of each student, letter of requisition from the Head of the Department to the Principal, itinerary (including names of district/village/taluk and name list of students and staff members after being validated and endorsed by the Principal well in advance of the study tour. A letter of endorsement from the Head of the Institution should accompany the proposal. Severe action will be taken if educational tours are organized without prior approval.

Application for railway concession for the tour should be sent well in advance to the Principal's Office through the Head of the Department. A report regarding completion of the tour by each student and staff members should be submitted to the Head of the Institution and to the RJDCE/DCE at the end of the tour.

Departmental Activities

Departmental activities should have the prior approval from the Dean of Student Affairs. The letter to the Dean must be routed through the Faculty-in-charge endorsed by the HoD. Unless otherwise permitted by the Principal, department activities should be held only after class hours. Attendance cannot be given for I & II UG classes for any department activity held during working hours.

Posters/Banners

No publicity materials such as posters/banners should be displayed outside the College campus. Publicity materials to be displayed within the campus should have the endorsement of the Head of the Department and the Dean of Student Affairs. Banners should be made in the officially prescribed size (check with Main gate security) and be placed in the frames kept near the main gate. Posters should be pasted in the boards at the main gate. Pasting of posters on the walls of College Buildings is prohibited.

Identity Cards

Student ID cards issued by the College should be worn by students at all times while on campus during working hours. It should be produced/surrendered, on demand, to any official of the College. Copy of ID card will not be accepted.

A duplicate ID card will be issued on loss of the original only after satisfactory explanation is provided. A fine of Rs. 300/- should be paid at the Bursar's Office.

Department Grievance Cell

Grievance cell in the Departments will address matters regarding ICA Marks. Students having any complaint against ICA may appeal to this cell. If the award given is not acceptable to the students, redressal of the grievance appealed for may be addressed to the Principal.

Committee for SC/ST

In adherence to the provisions laid down by the Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes (Prevention of Atrocities) Act. 1989, Act No. 33 OF 1989, dated 11/09/1989) & the Notification No. GSR - 316 (E) by Ministry of Welfare, New Delhi dated 31/03/1995, and as per the UGC Directives. the Madras Christian College has formed the Scheduled Caste (SC) and Scheduled Tribes (ST) Committee. This committee promotes the special interests of students and staff in the reserved category. It guides them to utilise the benefits of the schemes offered by the Government of India. Over the years more than 50 occupational courses have been offered. Now, courses are being conducted with the three fold objectives of training economically weaker sections, providing value added courses for regular students and enabling people of all age groups to continue their education. Institute for Advanced Christian Studies (IACS)

Institute for Advanced Christian Studies is a theological centre committed to offer theological courses, workshops, seminars and conferences. IACS offer the following courses:

- 1. PG Diploma in Christian Studies (PG DCS in distance mode)
- 2. Diploma in Christian Studies (DCS)
- 3. Certificate in Biblical Foundations (CBF)
- 4. Certificate in Church Music (CCM)

The DCS is an eight-month programme and classes are conducted twice a week (in the forenoon as well as in the afternoon) to facilitate the students and faculty of both the Aided and Self-Financed Streams to attend classes.

The CBF is a three-month programme with classes held twice a week in the evening from 6.00–8.00 pm to facilitate the working people to attend the classes. The CBF is extended and conducted in different villages every year as Satellite Centres. The Certificate in Church Music programme has

been introduced for Music lovers, especially Church Music. The classes are conducted in Bishop Heber Chapel by renowned national and international scholars in Church Music.

Senate of Serampore Courses at IACS, MCC:

- 2. Diploma in Christian Studies (DCS)

MCC Pulicat Estuarine Biological Research Centre (MCC-PEBRC)

With encouragement from the then Principal and financial support from the UGC, the MCC-PEBRC was founded in 1968. Regular field study tours for Zoology students are conducted to study the Pulicat Lake ecosystem and its biodiversity. Research on them has resulted in nearly twenty Ph.D. theses, publication of three books, and several journal and conference papers.

This field laboratory and its dormitory managed by the Department of Zoology, amidst the scenic beauties of the Pulicat Lake is utilized by all departments of our college for interdisciplinary studies relevant to that locale and its fisherfolk, in collaboration with the Department of Zoology.

With the funding from the United Board, a dormitory and other relevant facilities were added in 2009.

Centre for Peace Studies

As part of the 175-year celebrations of the college,

the Centre for Peace Studies was established in the College. Initially funded by the United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia, the centre has been involved in organizing programmes, publishing books and offering seminars on Peace Education, Universal Harmony and the like. The centre offers a Diploma course on Peace and Conflict Studies.

Meston Centre for Teaching and Learning (MCTL)

The Meston Centre for Teaching and Learning at Madras Christian College, established in 2020, is a learning space for faculty and students to collaborate and create innovative learning systems and models to meet the needs and challenges of the present. The Centre collaborates with individuals, academic departments, and various units of the college for capacity building and community learning to foster creativity and innovations in all aspects of teaching and learning. In addition to developing strategies, services, and programs, the Centre extends its resources and expertise to various institutions in India and abroad. Some of the specific objectives of the Centre are as follows:

- Collaborating in designing, developing, producing, and delivering online courses to be deposited in repositories for asynchronous modes of learning for promoting Hybrid Flexible learning (HyFlex)
- II. Constructing rubrics for learning assessments to increase student engagement
- III. Educating teachers about student-centered pedagogies. (Project based learning, Service learning based science camps etc)
- IV. Creating a learning analytics embedded learning management system (LMS) for

- flexible teaching and learning for the purpose of understanding and improving learning outcomes
- V. Designing modules for diverse learners and skill development (Microlearning modules for slow learners), Simulations for conducting practical classes
- VI. Earning while learning programmes for students for developing Innovative online contents – development of infographics, gamification, animations, schematics, flowcharts for modules (collaborating on educational technologies)
- VII. To scout potential teachers among students and incubate them throughout the UG or PG programme, building capacity to face the world of work and to place them in suitable educational institutions.
- VIII.To promote Science and Arts Communication by nurturing those who are inclined
- To strategize pedagogical research and outreach for training,
- X. To conduct conferences on pedagogical research and to provide consultancy in drafting educational policies
- XI. To identify and incubate potential educational entrepreneurs and train them on educational management and leadership

The Centre has already organized capacity building programs for faculty and workshops for research scholars. A production studio with facilities for creating audio and video recording is being set up to develop micro-learning modules and other teaching and learning resources for the benefit of the college

community. In collaboration with expertise from media sciences, the Centre looks forward to creating adaptable and interesting forms of academic connect to facilitate new age learning by interesting and engaging means.

Institute for Administrative Services Coaching (IASC)

Started in February 2012, the Institute for Administrative Services Coaching (IASC) is training students to prepare for UPSC, TNPSC and UGC/CSIR examinations. As a part of UGC 12th plan merged scheme, students belonging to SC/ST/OBC and minority communities are given free coaching classes. Members of various faculties and experts from respective fields train the registered students, to enrich their skills in group discussion, debate, interviews etc. Online classes are also conducted through Google Classroom through the Email ID: iasc@mcc.edu.in

Centre for Women's Studies (CWS)

The Centre for Women's Studies was started in 1987 with the three main objectives of Academic excellence through Awareness Generation regarding women's issues, human rights and gender issues; Social Advocacy of women's empowerment through its self- sustaining units and Outreach programmes which help the larger community. The programmes of the CWS are directed towards achieving these objectives. Through its activities the CWS has been involved in orienting, sensitizing and empowering both the faculty and students towards gender sensitization and gender mainstreaming. Talks and Webinar sessions are held regularly to create an awareness generation on women's empowerment and gender equity. Capacity building workshops are

held to hone the various skill sets of the students and the college community. The Tailoring Unit, "Thread and Tread" and the Photocopying Unit "Impressions", are self-sustaining units which aim to provide employment opportunities to women. Manna Scheme, a free meal scheme for the needy and economically weak students of our college for the last one decade, is a successful and popular initiative of the CWS.

Non-Resident Women Students Forum (NRWSF)

The Non-Resident Women Students Forum (NRWSF) provides an avenue for the non-resident women students to feel at home through amenities, activities and able guidance. The NRWSF also organizes frequent events related to gender sensitization and is a platform to address the specific needs of women students. Cultural programmes such as the International Women's Day brings the College community in solidarity to celebrate differences and promote peace. The MacNicol Lounge with modern facilities acts as a centre of convergence for women students.

Student Service for the Differently Abled (S.S.D.A)

In 1956, the Rev. R.S. Macnicol started an association called Student Service for the Blind (S.S.B) to render services exclusively to the blind students of the College. Now widening the services, S.S.B is rechristened as Students Service for the Differently Abled (S.S.D.A). S.S.D.A is the support system offering reading, scribing and other services through a band of student volunteers. It is coordinated by the President, Vice-president and assisted by two staff members. It organises sensitisation programme, skill enhancement

workshops, seminars, etc. S.S.D.A has installed Computer system with Screen reading software, Text-to-speech facility in Miller Memorial Library where Braille books are also available for students' access. Students with disabilities are encouraged to make use of the services offered through S.S.D.A. The President can be contacted through the email: ssda@mcc.edu.in

Miller Memorial Library

The Miller Memorial Library is named after Dr William Miller, the first Principal of the College. The former Prime Minister, Late Shri, Rajiy Gandhi inaugurated the new premises during the 150th year celebrations in 1987. The library works from 8 a.m. to 6.15 p.m. on all working days and is open to students and staff. Miller Memorial Library houses the respective Departmental Libraries as well. In addition to the standard infrastructure. unique sections such as Book Bank, Competitive Exam section, Maps, Audio/Video facility, Project and Thesis, Braille, etc., are available. Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC), ICT enabled access to library resources, e-lesson provided by National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) are offered to staff and students to supplement, augment and enhance the teaching and learning process. The Library is now an RFID enabled centre. Books in the library are barcoded for automated circulation. The library has subscriptions to many online databases and user D-Space for managing the digital contents.

Archives

The Archives is a unique entity of the College that has existed as a special unit in the Miller Memorial Library since 1982. It has a complete set of Magazines and Annual Calendars of the college, Government reports, Gazetteers, Journals and approximately 3500 books besides Travelogues and Memoirs. Digital versions of College records and College magazines are also available in the archives. Special collections in the unit include memorabilia of the Founders and century-old gadgets. It also houses a collection of 1500 photographs, the oldest dating back to the 19th century includes photographs of early missionaries, early Tamil Christians and officers in Madras. The unit provides services for a nominal fee, enabling active research in various fields

MCC Farm

The MCC Farm that had its inception in the 1960s in an informal way, has developed into a dynamic resource centre today for various agriculture and animal husbandry related work. Primarily conceptualized to be a platform meant to initiate students to real-time learning with hands-on training. this unit has been a highly impactful catalyst to the farming community in and around neighbouring villages. Students from the Departments of Botany, Chemistry, Commerce, Communication, Computer Science, Economics, Geography, History Journalism, Languages, Microbiology, Physics, Social Work, Statistics, Tourism and Zoology have benefited by contributing to the farm-based research and surveys.

A perfectly laid out agriculture field with appropriate fencing, the Farm also hosts a Community Centre, Composting Area, Farm Office, Orchard, Piggery, Poultry, 500kVA Solar Power Plant along with a 375,000 litre capacity Sewage Treatment Plant.

Of the thirty acres with effective fencing earmarked as farm area, the neatly laid out road, along with the built-up facilities that include the office space occupies around 2.5 acres. About 19 acres have been allotted for orchards that currently include amla, banana, coconut, guava, mango and sapota. The solar power plant that can cater to 50% of the entire power needs of the institute and the Sewage Treatment Plant that recycles all the grey water from campus on a daily basis occupies about five acres. Of the remaining 4.5 acres, the pond and the park occupy 1.5 acres, while the rest of the place is utilized for growing seasonal crops. The resultant yield / produce is subsequently sold to staff and neighbouring customers.

The staff and students of MCC have always been encouraged to conduct their projects at the MCC Farm. The concept of 'Earn While You Learn' has also been integrated into the system. In addition, a drive has been initiated in order to make the MCC Farm as a Volunteering Centre and Student Internship Centre, in order to add value to campus produce/commodities.

MCC Alumni Association

The MCC Alumni Association, formerly known as "Christian College Day Association" was founded in 1891 and is the oldest of its kind in India. In December 1963, the Association implemented a new constitution and changed its name to "Alumni Association" with the stated objectives of the development of the College and fostering of cultural and social interests of the alumni through meetings and publications.

The Alumni and Public Relations Office was set up in 1962 and it oversees the activities of the Association. Over the years, the Association has supported many noble causes in the College including the construction of the Devanesen Memorial theatre, the Miller Memorial Library, the International Guest House, the C. A. Abraham Pavilion and the compound wall. Today, the association has 22 chapters in India and 11 chapters in other parts of the world.

When a student leaves the College at the end of the course, he/she automatically becomes an annual member of the Association. One can then choose to become a permanent member, along with a long list of outstanding alumni, such as Dr S. Radhakrishnan, Dr A.L. Mudaliar, Dr Raja Ramanna, Mr T.T. Kurien to name a few. Life membership or Donor membership supports several alumni programmes and provides life-time contact with the Alma mater.

The MCC Alumni Association organised a historic "Global Alumni Reunion" on the 27th and 28th of July 2013. Around 1,500 alumni from across the globe witnessed this great event. Many distinguished alumni from various walks of life enriched this event with their presence.

The MCC Alumni Association also celebrated its 125 years of existence through a mega event on August 6 and 7, 2016.

Worship Service

The College begins with a short service of worship each working day at 8.15 a.m. for the Day Stream and at 1.20 p.m. for the Self-Financed Stream in the Anderson Hall. These are simple, short acts of devotion through a Hymn, Bible reading and prayer to which all are welcome.

Sunday Worship Services

Holy communion services at 7.30 a.m. in English and at 9.30 a.m. in Tamil are held in Bishop Heber Chapel. Contemporary Worship services at 11.30 a.m. and Evening Worship services at 6.00 p.m. are held in the Anderson Hall. All members of the College are welcome to these services. Christians in particular are urged to attend regularly and to make the services as acts of corporate worship by the College Community.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

In congruence with the vision of IQAC constituted by NAAC to ensure quality culture in Higher Educational Institutions, the IQAC at Madras Christian College initiated in the year 2004 – 2005, strives to realize Academic excellence, one of the prime aspects of the mission of the College. The IQAC at MCC aims to be "an advocate of value-driven and technology-driven practices in administrative and academic processes, leading to transformation of work culture and excellence".

The prime objectives of IQAC are:

to create a system for Quality assurance through

standardized procedures, protocols and practices. To ensure seamless and smooth adaptation / transition into the system, through collective endeavours of all the stakeholders of the College.

Students Placement Cell

The Placement Cell acts as a platform that bridges the industry and the students of the College. The Kibble Computer Centre

The Computer Centre, named after Dr W.F. Kibble, Former Professor of Mathematics, is situated in the floor above the Examination Office. It consists of an air-conditioned floor area of 1,640 sq. ft. which houses a Windows Application Server and a Windows Storage Server with Internet access. The Centre has a Local Area Network (LAN) with Microsoft software and functions as a laboratory of the Department of Computer Science.

Foreign Students Information System (FSIS)

All foreign students, including foreign students of Indian origin, admitted for various undergraduate, postgraduate, research or certificate programmes are required to get themselves registered with the Foreigners Regional Registration Officer (FRRO) in Chennai within 14 days of their arrival. Student Counselling Centre

Student Counselling Centre functions with a fulltime Student Counsellor on campus. The Centre caters to the personal and psychological needs of the students and maintains confidentiality. It also provides professional counselling support.

MCC Rural Service League School

MCC Rural Service League School was started in 1948. Free education is offered to needy students.

Co-curricular activities such as, Scout and Guides, Junior Red Cross, Green Corps Movement are offered and extra-curricular activities like, Exhibitions, Educational Tours and inter-house competitions are organized to benefit the students.

MCC Family Life Institute

MCC Family Life Institute is a unit of Madras Christian College located at Mappedu, Chengalpet Since 1960s, through the Jonathan district. Callaghan Memorial Centre of MCC, the students of MCC have been involving in rural housing, planning roads and community wells in Mappedu. In 1971. the Jonathan Callaghan Memorial Centre of MCC was named as Madras Christian College Family Life Institute and has been providing maternal and child health services to rural women in and around Mappedu village. The infrastructure for providing health services was constructed and completed in 1973. The MCC FLI was registered as a Clinic under the Tamil Nadu Clinical Establishment Act in January 2021. The activities include allopathic health services through a residential staff nurse. weekly consultation service from a medical practitioner, skill development training for women through certificate courses in tailoring, periodical medical camps to address specific needs of the beneficiaries, awareness generation programs on health, hygiene, women and child issues, support for entrepreneurship activities in the form of equipment or initial investments, family counselling and training of social work and NSS students.

MCC Community College

As a part of the Quartoseptcentennial celebrations of the College, a Community College was established in 2013 in West Tambaram. The Community College is an alternative system of education, which aims at the empowerment of the disadvantaged and the underprivileged through appropriate skill development leading to employment, in collaboration with the local industry and the community. The Community College promotes life-skill education and self-employment. At present two Diploma Courses viz., Computer Hardware Service and Nursing Health Assistant are offered.

MCC Kotagiri Community College

MCC launched its second Community College in 2018 in a locale surrounded by lush greens tea garden with a bungalow at Northern Hay, Kotagiri. It has adequate infrastructure for the Community College which offers courses viz., Diploma in Health Care, Diploma in Hospitality & Retail Marketing, and coaching classes for a few competitive examinations to benefit the local community and tribal students.

MCC Pulicat Community College

Pulicat is a small village adjoining the second largest brackish water lake in India, the Pulicat Lake. There are about 55 villages around the lake involved directly or indirectly on the lake. The Department of Zoology, Madras Christian College, has an 'off-campus' laboratory, the Estuarine Biological Laboratory at Pulicat since 1968. There has been a cordial relationship between MCC and the people of Pulicat. Considering the significant number of students who got admitted to MCC Community College, Tambaram for pursuing their studies in various disciplines, and a few doing Ph.D. program at MCC, the college decided to establish a community college for them at the Estuarine Biological Laboratory, providing job-oriented courses.

MCC-PCC was established to empower the people of Pulicat to be employable in various sectors in addition to be trained to have an additional income through a few vocational courses that would mould them to be entrepreneurs. The courses offered: 1. Diploma in Health Care; 2. Diploma in Computer Hardware and Mobile Repair.

MCC-Hanshin Hope Centre

As a result of a decade-old fruitful partnership with South Korean Universities, the MCC-Hanshin Hope Centre was established in 2018 at Mudichur area in West Tambaram. The centre has well-equipped kitchen, Halls, Bakery, Computer Room, Seminar Hall and a Library. These facilities will help B.Sc. Hospitality & Tourism students and faculty in practicum and in hosting women's self-help groups.

MCC Infirmary

The newly established health centre dedicated in 2019 is equipped with basic lifesaving equipment such as ambu bag, oxygen cylinder with flow meter, foldable stretcher, wheel chair, water dispenser (hot & cold), ECG Machine, separate observatory room for female and male with separate nebulizer machine and IV stand and backrest, emergency injections, etc.

As per the Tamil Nadu Pollution Control Board procedure, we have a tie-up with G.J. Multiclave for our bio-medical waste disposal services. The health centre is open on all working days from 09.00 a.m. to 12.00 p.m. and from 02.00 p.m. to 05.30 p.m.

MCC Boyd-Tandon School of Business

Founded by Rev. John Anderson, a Scottish missionary 184 Years ago, Madras Christian College has been tirelessly serving God while contributing richly in shaping minds towards Nation building. Being responsive to changing times MCC

Boyd-Tandon School of Business was set up in 2016. The two pillars of the MCC Boyd-Tandon School of Business are Dr Alexander John Boyd, the Prince of Principals (1938-56), and the world-renowned philanthropist & educator Ms. Chandrika Krishnamurthy Tandon who is also an MCC alumna (B.Com. 1970-'73). Hence the school is christened MCC Boyd-Tandon School of Business. The Foundation Stone was laid on 16 December 2019 and the building construction is in rapid progress.

The Business School is engaged with the industry and business world networking with the corporates to poise Management Education as the learning experience springing from and leading to industrial situations and global trends. While preparing to set up a world-class Business School with its flagship AICTE approved programme of PGDM, it offers Professional Diplomas and Certificates to upskill youth with the prevalent trend in the corporate world such as Business Analytics, Digital Marketing, Corporate Social Responsibility, etc.

MCC Entrepreneurship Development Cell (MCC-EDC)

Entrepreneurship Development Cell of Madras Christian College was initiated during September 2020 to help young innovators to become a quintessential part of the entrepreneurship ecosystem development. The initiative comes at the right time as there is a spur in the development of innovative ecosystem, and when 2010-20 is declared as 'India's Decade of Innovation'.

The objectives of EDC are to:

 provide space for the MCC student community to discuss their ideas, metamorphose them into innovative proposals, generate IP, and finally execute their business plans through incubation,

ii) to offer training and mentoring for the students to help hone their entrepreneurship skills.

Thus the EDC strives to provide a conducive innovation and entrepreneurship/start-up ecosystem for the vibrant student community of Madras Christian College.

As an initial measure, the EDC of MCC has been registered with TN-EDII, IEDP HUB, CED Anna University, since September 2020. Furthermore, in line with the aforementioned objectives, the EDC has formed the MCC ideation club during October 2020 to foster innovation among students. To encourage and reward the young student innovators, MCC Innovation Contest has also been initiated from the year 2021.

MCC Institution's Innovation Council (MCC-IIC)

Madras Christian College has established the Institution's Innovation Council (MCC-IIC) as per the norms of the Ministry of Education's Innovation Cell (MIC), Government of India during the calendar year 2020-2021.
