It has a wellestablished Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system. This system helps the College to collect, store and manage data effectively from various departments and units The Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) Management Information system/software of the College manages the entire administration, including Admissions, Enrollment, Fee Payment, Library, Campus Operations, Academic Management and Examrelated activities. This software helps in the data management of the entire student community. In addition, the software also provides scope for human resourcerelated activities. To administer finances, the College uses separate accounting software. Modules Used at Present for Management: • Online Application and Admission: The role of ERP is vital in the Student admission process. Admission to MCC is based on the merit of the students, and the ERP facilitates this process. The ERP Software collects, and categorises applications, tabulates the selections made and even corresponds with the applicant. The ERP also facilitates the collection of fees and the enrolment process. • Students Academic Management: From the time a student enters the College until they graduate, all the records are maintained in the

ERP. Selection of Language, Allied, NonMajor Elective and Cocurricular subjects are entirely online on the ERP

portal. The marking of student attendance is also online. Tenday attendance status lists are also uploaded online for students and

parents information. All notices are uploaded on the College website. In addition, messages are sent through SMS for information and immediate action. • Examination Processes: An Integrated software with an upgraded examination module has been installed. The application for examination, the payment of fees and the declaration of results have all been made online. • Staff information: All staff members information is also maintained in the ERP. Intimation of pay slips is communicated with the support of this system. Software for specific tasks • Finance: The finance and accounts of the College are maintained with the help of staff trained in the accounting software Tally. The operations of the administration and finances are entirely computerised, thus facilitating timely reporting and efficient resource allocation. • Library: While the academic and administrative ERP maintains the log of visitors to the Library using biometric methods, a Library Management Software (INFROPLUS) is installed at the Library to keep track of the books and journals. The ERP system, therefore, helps by procuring and storing an enormous volume of data and facilitates processes in the areas of Planning and Development, administration, Finance and accounts, Student admission and the examinations in the College

1.4.2 - How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution?

Feedback Obtained

The Internal Quality Assurance cell of the College collects feedback from the Alumni and current students every year. It is mandatory for all the students to submit their feedback on parameters relating to Academics, especially Teaching, Leaning and Evaluation. The feedback collected through digital forms require responses that obtain scores on a four-point scale (Very Good, Good, Satisfactory and Unsatisfactory) The questions in the Feedback form pertain to Teaching-Learning and evaluation methods adopted by the departments in the conduct of various courses and Laboratory work. The questions are on the depth of course content, sufficiency of study resources in the Department and Library, Laboratory and/or computing facilities available, extent of coverage of syllabus, communication skills and effectiveness of teaching by the Faculty, Learning methodologies adapted for wholesome education, fairness of evaluation, outcome of study of the courses and their applicability. The data collected through online survey is analyzed by the Faculty of the Department of Statistics of the College. The results presented as graphical representations are submitted to the Management and subsequently presented in the meeting of the Heads of Departments, to make relevant changes in the forthcoming Academic year and decision-making. The feedback collection exercise and analysis is done to improve the Academics to higher level of student-centric teaching, outcomebased learning, and to equip the student community for employment.

2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Mentoring system is practised in all the Departments wherein every faculty is assigned students from each class of under-graduation and post-graduation classes. A Student, on joining the respective Department, is assigned to a faculty of the Department. A mentor maintains his/her group of mentees until the mentee graduates. The entire group meets at least three times a semester. These meetings are scheduled at a convenient time as agreed by the group. The mentor also maintains a record of each mentee, both personal and academic. The meetings of the mentor and mentees are also recorded. The number of mentees attending a particular session, the problems discussed, solutions arrived at, academic preparation and progress of each mentee are recorded by the mentor and maintained in the Department. Later the Head of the Department is appraised about the same. In case of a request for change arising from either the mentor or the mentee, the Head of the Department inspects the situation and resolves the issue. As of now, the mentor-mentee ratio of the institution is 1: 21. During the Covid times, the mentors were able to keep track of the mentees through online platforms like Zoom and Google Meet. The Mentor-Mentee system is effectively functioning in the College. The mentees have benefited as they could get their doubts and concerns cleared immediately by the mentor itself. The presence of peer support, guidance and help has benefited the students by improving their academic performance. The mentor and peer group address the intellectual inadequacies of slow learners. The advanced learners are encouraged and oriented to widen their scope of study by enrolling in courses from the School of Continuing Education, Institute for Administrative Services and MOOCs.

4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website)

The College's 320-acre campus with vast infrastructure, installations and equipment is maintained by the Estate office. The Estate office has policies to carry out both preventive and post-maintenance activities. Regular preventive maintenance is carried out through AMCs, and periodic checks of electrical, water installations, equipment, sewage and garbage disposal. Emergencies are attended to ensure that campus life is normal. Normally departments, units, halls, residential staff and students register their maintenance requirements with the Estate office which in turn, attends to all such requirements /grievances regularly. The Estate office functions through the Estate Manager who reports to the Bursar. The Estate Manager is assisted by • Electrical Supervisors • Civil supervisors • Electricians • Carpenters • Plumbers • Clerical assistants • Sanitary workers • Campus workers, Sweepers and Gardeners Maintenance of restrooms and cleaning of classrooms and common areas is outsourced. Outsourced housekeeping is carried out by trained personnel. Science laboratories: Laboratories, classrooms and the library are functional from 8 am to 6.15 pm on all working days. There are adequate laboratory assistants for the Science Departments having labs of Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and computer laboratories who take care of the maintenance of labs and equipment placed in the labs. Air conditioners, computers and network facilities are maintained either by annual maintenance contract (AMC) or serviced by agencies/manufacturers as and when need arises. The stock in the labs is verified for the available equipment and damaged ones are discarded. Maintenance of Electrical and Electronic Equipment is checked regularly at the end of every semester. Breakage register is maintained in the laboratories. Library: The Librarian looks after the maintenance of the library books, journals, periodicals, furniture, electronic equipment, computers and software. He coordinates with the Estate Manager and System Administrator to ensure regular maintenance is done. Weeding of books is done on a regularbasis in the general library. Pest Management measures are regularly carried out in the library and in other buildings. Since the Library operates RFID, Inventory Management is made easy through this technology and software. Sports Complex: State of the art sports Indore Stadium partly funded by UGC was built on campus. The stadium provides one full size basketball court, four shuttle badminton courts and one volley ball court. The stadium is well ventilated and paved with imported wooden floor. The stadium is ideal for conducting both National and International level competitions. Power generation and energy conservation: All buildings are connected through a 1000 kVA transformer and two 250 kVA generators to provide uninterrupted power supply. Two solar power plants with total capacity of 600 kWp generate 90,000 units of electricity

every month. All power/electrical installations are under AMC for proper maintenance. Water supply: There are nine Reverse Osmosis (RO) water dispensers supplying high quality drinking water. The RO Plants are cleaned and maintained on a regular basis. There are two large overhead tanks and eight open wells and six bore wells in the campus providing water.

5.3.2 The College Union Society (CUS) is a student body that represents the interests of students in College Administration. It is responsible for organizing various student activities. The CUS consists of the student chairman, student secretary, conveners of various portfolios, department representatives and class representatives. The Principal, the President of the CUS, along with a Vice-president and Staff Advisor, who are also faculty members, provide guidance to the student leaders of the CUS. All the student office bearers and representatives are elected by the students through a democratic and transparent process by an independent Election commission. The student chairman and student secretary are also members of the college Senatus, the highest executive body of the College, and many other important committees of the College such as the Finance Committee and the Disciplinary Committee. This enables the participation of the student community in taking major decisions concerning the curricular and cocurricular activities of the College. Every academic Department has a Board of Studies that has student representatives. The College Academic Council which has wide ranging powers to decide upon academic matters also has student representatives. The CUS

organizes many noteworthy events throughout the year such as Culturals, Literary Debating events, Theatre, Sports and Academics. Some of the sports events organized by the CUS are meant for the faculty as well. Some of the important events organized by the CUS regularly are given below: College Auditions: The college Auditions seek to identify various talents and abilities of students through a series of competitions focusing on cultural as well as literary and debating events. Aurora: Aurora is a cultural event organized exclusively for the women students of the College. It aims to serve as a platform for women students to display their unique talents and abilities. Theatre Night: Theatre night is an extravagant and high-quality display of drama and theatre in the College, conducted by the CUS. Theatre Night has been the springboard for many students to enter professional theatre career. Deepwoods: Deepwoods is an intercollegiate cultural event organized annually by the CUS. The three-day iconic event attracts participants from various colleges across Chennai and all over the country. It offers an array of exciting events ranging from music to dance, debates and arts. Students generate the funds needed for this event through sponsorship and entrepreneurship and in the process, they hone their administrative and leadership skills. Sports: There are various sporting events organized by the CUS such as the Danis Esau Memorial Inter-collegiate football tournament, Teacher's Day Sports etc. CUS is also involved in many social welfare activities such as organizing blood donation camps and cleaning up the College premise through 'Campus Cleaning Programme'. The Institution practices decentralization and participative management in all its activities and initiatives by involving the Deans, Heads of Departments/Units, faculty members and students at different levels of decisionmaking. The Governing Body of the College includes representatives from the Board of Directors, Government, University Grants Commission (UGC), Deans who are faculty of the College, Bursar and, the Principal and Secretary of the College. Recommendations from various committees of the College are brought to this Body, and after detailed review, decisions are taken. Issues are discussed and decisions are made to ensure the conduct of day-to-day affairs of the college, and matters relating to the Government and other stakeholders. Curriculum development, in line with advances in the industry, is done every year by most of the departments in the College. The Department conducts a Board of Studies meeting, which consists of the Department faculty, subject experts from other Colleges and student representatives. Once the new curriculum is framed, it is presented before the Academic Council for approval. The Academic Council consists of the Principal, University Nominee, Heads of the Departments and Units, and student representatives. These meetings are minuted, and suggestions are made with respect to changes in the curriculum.

Curriculum Development	Several Departments revised their syllabi to keep abreast with changes in the Industry. Departments that brought in changes in their curriculum include the Departments of Political Science, Economics, Chemistry, Zoology, Hindi (SFS), Geography, Tourism and Travel Management (SFS) and Visual Communication (SFS). The Department of Microbiology introduced the PhD program. The Department of Chemistry introduced a novel course on Cheminformatics. The process of curriculum development involves subject experts and individuals with industry experience. The Board of Studies is convened by the Head of the Department and the recommendations are brought to the Academic council for approval.
Teaching and Learning	The Institution provides the required facilities to ensure that the teaching and learning methods are effective. LCD Projectors, laptops and software like SPSS and Tally are provided to Departments. Classrooms are equipped with smart boards and special training is provided to the faculty to use these technologies. Project Based Learning (PBL) has been facilitated in the Departments resulting in synthesizing of new information on the subject domain leading to presentation of papers in conferences.
Examination and Evaluation	The College adopts rules and regulations pertaining to examinations as and when they are introduced by the University of Madras. The double valuation system is followed to ensure fairness in the valuation of papers. The exam fee payment for regular and arrear papers are now being collected online. Detection of plagiarism with the use of URKUND software for all MPhil thesis has been made mandatory. Old Photocopying machines have been replaced by new machines for better use.
Research and Development	The College encourages Research Development through the Dean of

Research Development. The Faculty members are involved in research and development extensively. The Institution has a number of research projects (both minor and major) from Government bodies, and Private institutions, both in the country and abroad. Faculty members are actively involved in presenting research papers in International and National Conferences organized both within and outside the country in addition to publishing articles in reputed journals. The College allocates annual grants to the Research Development Deanery to provide research grants. The Library has been completely

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

revamped in terms of infrastructure and the accessibility of resources. Various new sections are introduced exclusively for references, book banks, competitive exams, periodicals, maps, projects and theses, etc. RFID facility is also installed in the library. The library acquired access to many online databases through subscription and is using D Space for managing the digital contents. The Staff browsing center was also renovated. The library through ICT helps in empowering faculty and students to achieve excellence. Rain water harvesting system has been installed with about 66 wells of various dimensions which would help in harvesting almost a third of the campus' annual consumption of water. The gates to the College have been renovated. The Statistical Computing Laboratory with new computers, servers, and staff console was dedicated for the use of students. Kitchens in the Halls were renovated. A modern Students Centre with modular kitchens and alluring dining arrangements were dedicated and opened for use. The Quartoseptcentennial Building with spacious classes was declared open. MCC Infirmary was also opened with obligatory equipment for best medical services to the community.

Human Resource Management

The Dr. Chandran Devanesen Centre for Human Resource Development conducts various programs from time to time for both students and faculty members.

Training programs and workshops on various issues are organized by different Departments regularly which

	help the faculty to stay abreast of the latest developments in the respective fields. These programs help in increasing the morale of the faculty members and help them to easily adopt new technologies and methods.

Internship recruitments from EY and Zoho were organised, and suitable students were selected. Besides interactions for placement and internship, various Departments of the College actively collaborate with the Industry to enhance knowledge exchange by way of inviting alumni and eminent persons from the industry for lectures, workshops and conferences.

Title of the Practice: Solar Power Plant Objective / Best Practice: To provide a green campus Solar Power Plant has been installed at 500 KV Ground @ Farm and 100KV Rooftop @ Botany Department The Context: Green campus - To trap sunlight and generate electricity. The Practice: There is an ever increasing demand in energy especially electricity, hence, renewable energy like sunlight could be trapped which in turn generates electricity. Hence the college has installed solar panels as an alternative source of energy to serve the 360Acre campus. Coverage area 100x80 with1600 panels and each panel -315 watts. Evidence of Success: About 49 electricity for the campus is generated from this renewable source. Problems encountered and resources required: Nothing mentionable. 2. Title of the Practice: Innovative methodology in Teaching -Learning Process Objective / Best Practice: Innovative methodology in teaching - Learning Process The Context: Innovative ideas, creativity, skit performance are encouraged and included in the syllabus as a part of Internal Continuous Assessment - 3 of the college. The Practice: Self and peer assessment techniquethrough Quiz and Seminars is regularly done. A Tutor/mentor is responsible for the student growth addressing their grievances. Every teacher in the Department is allotted 15 students as Mentees every year. The mentors will look after students academic as well as personal issues. A final semester Project which concentrates on Green Studies, Womens Writing, Art and Aesthetics Movements, and Cultural Studies is being regularly done by the Literature department. Department of Chemistry offers value-added course 'Cheminformatics' through the School of Continuing Education, MCC from 2018-2019 onwards. Evidence of Success: Research articles published in reputed journals are displayed in the department to showcase the research activities of the department and also to encourage the staff, research scholars and students of the Department of Chemistry (Aided). Best Field Work Student and Best Camper in Rural camp is awarded every year for the students of BSW (SFS). The Book review club is an effort to motivate students to read books to enhance knowledge on corporates and practical world. This club operates with reviews on books by renowned authors and corporate houses. This updates students with a broader perspective of Management concepts. The Department of Geography, Tourism Travel Management could create awareness on ecologically sustainable urban settlements by organizing exhibitions. Problems encountered and resources required: More resources are required to perform all the activities of the students during the learning process.

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

Academic Excellence: Madras Christian College has good infrastructure, a campus rich in Biodiversity with adequate residential facilities for students and

staff, apart from a farm and other related amenities that contribute to the sustenance of the Excellent Status of the Institution in academics. According to the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD) National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF), MCC obtained 10th position in the category of 'Arts and Science Colleges' in the country. In 'The Week' ranking of Colleges, MCC is ranked the 6th position in India. Also MCC is ranked No.1 in Chennai according to 'India Today' ranking. Our College maintains its position within the Top Ten Colleges in the country. Another area, in which the academic standards are high at MCC, is the infrastructure developments. Rain Water Harvesting System at MCC was dedicated on 5th July 2018. The project has been funded by Asian Paints as part of their CSR and was facilitated by Dr. Sekhar Raghavan (Physics Alumnus of MCC, 1964 -1969) through Akash Ganga Trust, Chennai. The project comprises 66 wells of various dimensions. The total quantity of rain water harvested through this project in the College premises in a year would be an overwhelming and astounding quantity of 1, 27, 57,640 litres, which is approximately a third of our campus annual consumption of water. A computerized rain gauge has been installed to monitor rainfall and to measure the quantum of water charged into the soil on a daily basis. The Halls of Residence are governed by the students. A cabinet is present which comprises of the Chairman, General Secretary and the team. The team discusses issues, consults with the residents and decisions are taken. The Hall administration has been executed through 'STUDENT AUTONOMY' and is unique practice and legacy that enriches students with capacity building towards leadership. Unique way of conducting ICAT III: Of three ICATs, conduct of ICAT III is based on innovative techniques and will span over the entire duration of the semester. Department of Chemistry conducts in a unique way to bring out the presentation of skills on their learning and understanding the core subjects. Each class is allotted a day towards the end of the semester. On that day, the students exhibit their presentations, which involve microprojects, review work, pedagogy techniques, model making etc. The outcome of such innovative conduct of ICA III resulted in paper presentations in different conferences, publications and also project proposals. Attendance for the students of our College are marked through Wi-Fi enabled Tabs has been introduced from 2018. This system facilitates many analysis of this attendance data, including periodical reporting of status to students and parents online. Serving Humanity is a part of Madras Christian College hence MCC Kotagiri Community College (MCC KCC) was dedicated on 27th August 2018 which offers two Diploma Programmes (Diploma in Healthcare, Diploma in Hospitality Retail Marketing) and Coaching Classes for few competitive examinations. Another Community College named MCC Hanshin Hope Centre at Mudichur was declared open on 17th October 2018
