Zoology majors can delve into subjects like political science or economics. Specialized programs prepare students for real-life situations. The dynamic curriculum empowers students with versatile skills for success in an interconnected world.

Madras Christian College (MCC) fosters a deep sense of bonding with the nation and its ethos through curricula and pedagogies. The NSS unit organizes events like Independence Day, Constitution Day celebrations, and Kargil Vijay Diwas, instilling patriotism. Activities like cleanliness drives, awareness quizzes, preamble reading, pledge-taking, volunteering, and webinars promote civic responsibility. Social Ethics courses cultivate ethical values. 16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

The Madras Christian College firmly believes in the policy of inclusiveness. The College admits students from varying levels of learning capabilities originating from both rural and urban centres. The Choice-Based Credit System facilitates a flexible learning mechanism for students from all backgrounds. Internal Continuous Assessments assist the faculty in tracking the student's academic performances and taking suitable action. For Advanced learners, the Internal Continuous Assessment Test - II is converted into an

innovative test wherein the Students are encouraged to design a product or process. This is facilitated through the MCC - MRF Innovation Park. Students are encouraged to earn additional diploma and certificate courses from the School of Continuing Education and other MOOC platforms. They are also encouraged to enrol in MCC Institute of Administrative Services Coaching, to prepare for competitive exams. A two-fold pathway is practised to support slow learners and achieve overall success. One, English Language Teaching, Remedial Teaching and Bridge Courses and Language lab facilities are provided to benefit students from the non-English education system. Second, the Peer - learning system of Halls and Mentoring system in the academic departments offers additional support towards educational enrichment for slow learners. One-on-one mentoring Interactions, E-Content and audio-visual teaching aids support slow learners.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

The Choice-Based Credit System provides a number of choices for students in selecting the courses that suit their growth. Many undergraduate programmes, mainly media related and all postgraduate programmes, have projects and internships as part of their curriculum. Research and seminar presentations are practised in most of the departments. Periodic industrial visits, fieldwork, rural camps and study tours also help students in experiential learning.

The College also provides facilities like Bioinformatics Infrastructure Facility, Farm, Estuarine Biological Laboratory, Pulicat, and Family Life Institute, to facilitate students' interests in the participatory programme. Programmes like Value Education, Environmental Studies, Soft Skills and Personality Development give students hands-on experience regarding social and environmental aspects.

The institution through the College Union Society, Student Council, Cabinets of the Halls of Residence, the Associations/Societies of various academic Departments, Non-Resident Women Students' Forum, National Service Scheme, National Cadet Corps, Scrub Society, Wildlife Conservative Club, Scrub Society, Student Christian Movement, Theatre Club, and Tamil Peravai hones leadership and professional skills.

In the last few years, the College has blended traditional chalk and board methods and contemporary IT-enabled teaching and learning methods as part of its pedagogy. All Departments are equipped with WIFI, projectors, laptops, printers, scanners, etc., The College also subscribes to software like SPSS, Adobe, and Microsoft-based operating systems. The Library is digitalized, and the catalogue is available through OPAC. The students and faculty are provided access to the digital library. Since the pandemic optimal usage of digital platforms like Zoom and Google Classroom has been adopted for reaching out to students. Although offline classes have resumed, the College encourages interaction through the Learning Management System in a blended mode. In addition, the College has established the IT Infrastructure Committee to analyse and provide appropriate solutions to the needs of the Institution.

Students receive an official email ID upon enrolling for the programme. Using this ID, the students can register themselves in the LMS. In addition, Access to N-LIST and NDLI portals are provided by the College to help students access internationally published research journals and e-books.

Three critical aspects were carried out in the process of integrating IT based on the feedback received from the students and faculty. The Course Registration Slip facility was incorporated into the ERP. It enables the students to view the course opted/allotted for the respective semester and either apply or clarify the course they have registered. The Examinations Office will use this confirmed list to generate the Examinations fee and Examination Hall Ticket.

The second addition to the IT integration is the Online Entry of ICA test marks by the course faculty and the Publication of ICA Test marks in the student mobile app and the College Website. The student can view their Internal Continuous Assessment Test marks in the ERP portal, enabling them to plan for their upcoming ICA Tests. Through this feature, the Examinations Office can assess each student's

internal performance in each course, and faculty were able to adopt suitable teaching methodologies to improve the teaching and learning process.

Thirdly, the office made online student feedback mandatory by linking it with the release of E- Hall Ticket. This measure ensured that every student gave feedback about the course, faculty, classroom management, resources and infrastructure at the end of every semester before the commencement of the Examination.

Madras Christian College (MCC) is dedicated to create an ecosystem for research and development, and the institutional research facilities are frequently updated. During 2021-22, new state-of-the-art facilities such as MCC-MRF Innovation Park and Meston Centre for Teaching and Learning were created. The research facility at Pulicat was refurbished as Pulicat Estuarine Biological Research Centre, the aquaculture unit of the Zoology Department upgraded, and lab- and pilot-scale algal culture facilities upgraded in the Department of Microbiology. The institutional research policies are provided in the website and are constantly amended and updated by the Deanery - Research & Development of the college. Seed money grant for faculty was instituted to explore their potential and enhance their contributions to society's welfare through pilot projects and fifteen faculty members have been awarded with the seed money grant for the year 2021-22. Inter-departmental innovative contests/open-house displays for students were organized to enable diverse perspectives to converge in pursuit of solutions. The college has initiated incentives and awards during the year to faculty and researchers for promotion of research. Faculty members and research scholars who have published in Scopus/Web of Science/UGC-CARE indexed journals are presented with certificates of appreciation and cash incentives. MCC Research Colloquium continues to create

awareness on research, including journal selection, indexing, metrics and manuscript writing through online meetings that help the college to achieve 100+ scopus indexed publications in 2021-2022.

3.3 - Innovation Ecosystem

3.3.1 - Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and creation and transfer of knowledge supported by dedicated centres for research, entrepreneurship, community orientation, incubation, etc.

Madras Christian College has continued the registration of its Entrepreneurship Development Cell (MCC-EDC) under the statutory body TN-EDII (University of Madras Hub), Government of Tamil Nadu, and instituted Institution's Innovation Council (MCC-IIC) under the Innovation Cell, Ministry of Education, Government of India, during 2021. The college strives to improve the innovation ecosystem through various measures including the conduct of awareness programmes, scouting of potential proposals, and best Innovators' contest during each semester. The best student innovators team from each department was provided a seed money of Rs. 10,000 /-, to work upon their proposals. The college has also organized various programmes through the above cells as per the calendar provided by the MoE. MCC-MRF Innovation Park is being constructed at the cost of nearly Rs. 30 crores, while started functioning in makeshift space. Many student startups have evolved through the ecosystem and funds have been generated with the help of various Governmental and Non-governmental funding agencies as well as from angel investors. On the research front, the college has also provided seed money grant of Rs. 5.1 lakhs to 15 faculty members to foster research. Fourteen patents have been provisionally filed on inventions in the Indian

Patent Office in 2021-22.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

The college has laid underground optical fibre cable across the campus and installed sixty seven high speed Wi-Fi hotspots. The classrooms, laboratories, library, staff room, seminar halls etc are Wi-Fi enabled.

The staff and students can access data and high speed internet (100 Mbps) through their mobile phones / tablets / laptops / desktops with the help of Wi-Fi hotspots. All Wi-Fi hotspots are connected

with UPS for seamless connectivity.

Firewall (Sophos XG 330 Network Protection) ensures multi-layered Advanced Threat Protection. Activities over routers, switches and devices added or removed from the network are continuously monitored. With command-and-control detection, Intrusion Prevention System (IPS) and VPN gateway, it protects the network by blocking harmful incoming and outgoing traffic and enables secure access for authorized users. IQAC will prioritize enhancing Graduate Outcomes Data Capture during convocation registration, thereby ensuring high-quality data input for future NIRF assessments.

IQAC and the Department of Statistics organized an FDP on Data

Analysis using SPSS from Sep 1-3, 2021 to train faculty to analyse data. Faculty from Aided and SFS streams participated.

The IQAC review meeting on Nov 12, 2021, discussed academic audit, green audit planning, OBE implementation, facilities for differently-abled students, NIRF registration, and strategies for improving NIRF scores.

IQAC and MCCRC jointly organized a Faculty Development Program on 'Publish and Flourish' on Nov 19-20, 2021. It aimed to guide Faculty Research Scholars in selecting reputable journals and writing research articles for Web of Science/Scopus-indexed publications. The FDP had 111 participants from Aided and SFS streams.

In summary, IQAC actively organized various programs, including Faculty Development Programs and review meetings, to enhancing academic quality, research capabilities, and overall institutional growth.

Internal Continuous Assessments assist the faculty in tracking the student's academic performances and taking suitable action. For Advanced learners, the Internal Continuous Assessment Test - II is converted into an innovative test wherein the Students are encouraged to design a product or process. This is facilitated through the MCC - MRF Innovation Park. Students are encouraged to earn additional diploma and certificate courses from the School of Continuing Education and other MOOC platforms. They are also encouraged to enrol in MCC Institute of Administrative Services Coaching, to prepare for competitive exams. A two-fold pathway is practised to support slow learners and achieve overall success. One, English Language Teaching, Remedial Teaching and Bridge Courses and Language lab facilities are provided to benefit students from the non-English education system. Second, the Peer - learning system of Halls and Mentoring system in the academic departments offers additional support towards educational enrichment for slow learners. The Choice-Based Credit System provides a number of choices for students in selecting the courses that suit their growth. Three critical aspects were carried out in the process of integrating IT based on the feedback received from the students and faculty. The Course Registration Slip facility was incorporated into the ERP. It enables the students to view the course opted/allotted for the respective semester and either apply or clarify the course they have registered. The Examinations Office will use this confirmed list to generate the Examinations fee and Examination Hall Ticket.

The second addition to the IT integration is the Online Entry of ICA test marks by the course faculty and the Publication of ICA Test marks in the student mobile app and the College Website. The student can view their Internal Continuous Assessment Test marks in the ERP portal, enabling them to plan for their upcoming ICA Tests. Through this feature, the Examinations Office can assess each student's internal performance in each course, and faculty were able to adopt suitable teaching methodologies to improve the teaching and learning process.

Thirdly, the office made online student feedback mandatory by linking it with the release of E- Hall Ticket. This measure ensured that every student gave feedback about the course, faculty, classroom management, resources and infrastructure at the end of every semester before the commencement of the Examination.

Madras Christian College (MCC) is dedicated to create an ecosystem for research and development, and the institutional research facilities are frequently updated. During 2021-22, new state-of-the-art facilities such as MCC-MRF Innovation Park and Meston Centre for Teaching and Learning were created. The research facility at Pulicat was refurbished as Pulicat Estuarine Biological Research Centre, the aquaculture unit of the Zoology Department upgraded, and lab- and pilot-scale algal culture facilities upgraded in the Department of Microbiology. The institutional research policies are provided in the website and are constantly amended and updated by the Deanery - Research & Development of the college. Seed money grant for faculty was instituted to explore their potential and enhance their contributions to society's welfare through pilot projects and fifteen faculty members have been awarded with the seed money grant for the year 2021-22. Inter-departmental innovative contests/open-house displays for students were organized to enable diverse perspectives to converge in pursuit of solutions. The college has initiated incentives and awards during the year to faculty and researchers for promotion of research. Faculty members and research scholars who have published in Scopus/Web of Science/UGC-CARE indexed journals are presented with certificates of appreciation and cash incentives. MCC Research Colloquium continues to create awareness on research, including journal selection, indexing, metrics and manuscript writing through online meetings that help the college to achieve 100+ scopus indexed publications in 2021-2022.

3.3 - Innovation Ecosystem

3.3.1 - Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and creation and transfer of knowledge supported by dedicated centres for research, entrepreneurship, community orientation, incubation, etc.

Madras Christian College has continued the registration of its Entrepreneurship Development Cell (MCC-EDC) under the statutory body TN-EDII (University of Madras Hub), Government of Tamil Nadu, and instituted Institution's Innovation Council (MCC-IIC) under the Innovation Cell, Ministry of Education, Government of India, during 2021. The college strives to improve the innovation ecosystem through various measures including the conduct of awareness programmes, scouting of potential proposals, and best Innovators' contest during each semester. The best student innovators team from each department was provided a seed money of Rs. 10,000 /-, to work upon their proposals. The college has also organized various programmes through the above cells as per the calendar provided by the MoE. MCC-MRF Innovation Park is being constructed at the cost of nearly Rs. 30 crores, while started functioning in makeshift space. Many student startups have evolved through the ecosystem and funds have been generated with the help of various Governmental and Non-governmental funding agencies as well as from angel investors. On the research front, the college has also provided seed money grant of Rs. 5.1 lakhs to 15 faculty members to foster research. Fourteen patents have been provisionally filed on inventions in the Indian Patent Office in 2021-22.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

The college has laid underground optical fibre cable across the campus and installed sixty seven high speed Wi-Fi hotspots. The classrooms, laboratories, library, staff room, seminar halls etc are Wi-Fi enabled.

The staff and students can access data and high speed internet (100 Mbps) through their mobile phones / tablets / laptops / desktops with the help of Wi-Fi hotspots. All Wi-Fi hotspots are connected with UPS for seamless connectivity.

Firewall (Sophos XG 330 Network Protection) ensures multi-layered Advanced Threat Protection. Activities over routers, switches and devices added or removed from the network are continuously monitored. With command-and-control detection, Intrusion Prevention System (IPS) and VPN gateway, it protects the network by blocking harmful incoming and outgoing traffic and enables secure access for authorized users. Multiple Internet Service Provider (ISP) has been provided. Secure IDs are used to access the system.

The institution is allocating budget for hardware and software procurement under capital expenditure. For routine maintenance, budget is allocated under computer expenditures overhead. IT facilities are updated periodically thus maintaining high standards as far as IT infrastructure is concerned.

CUS hosts key events like College Auditions (culturally and literary focused), Aurora (celebrating women's talents), Theatre Night (drama showcase), Deep Woods (annual intercollegiate cultural event), and various sports events, including the Danis Esau Memorial Intercollegiate football tournament. There were 61 participants from various college departments. Dr. C James, the Resource Person, provided guidance on curriculum design, alignment, and learning outcome assessment. IQAC will prioritize enhancing Graduate Outcomes Data Capture during convocation registration, thereby ensuring high-quality data input for future NIRF assessments.

IQAC and the Department of Statistics organized an FDP on Data Analysis using SPSS from Sep 1-3, 2021 to train faculty to analyse data. Faculty from Aided and SFS streams participated.

The IQAC review meeting on Nov 12, 2021, discussed academic audit, green audit planning, OBE implementation, facilities for differently-abled students, NIRF registration, and strategies for improving NIRF scores.

IQAC and MCCRC jointly organized a Faculty Development Program on 'Publish and Flourish' on Nov 19-20, 2021. It aimed to guide Faculty Research Scholars in selecting reputable journals and writing research articles for Web of Science/Scopus-indexed publications. The FDP had 111 participants from Aided and SFS streams.

In summary, IQAC actively organized various programs, including Faculty Development Programs and review meetings, to enhancing academic quality, research capabilities, and overall institutional growth.
